WOMEN AFTER DUNNE

Temperance Advocates Wait on Chicago's Mayor.

DEMAND LAW BE ENFORCED

Tell the Mayor that the Saloons Are Open Sundays and Retire to "Pray that He Will Change His Mind," When He Says It Is "Not up to Him."

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Surrounded by a hundred women, some angry and others weeping, Mayor Dunne sat in his office yesterday, and met their demands that saloons be closed on Sunday, by a petition of his declaration that it is not "up to him," to enforce the law upon that point. They were not satisfied with this response, for they represented the Cook County organizations of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. They left the city hall saying they would pray that he will change his mind.

At the close of a six hour service of song and prayer, constituting the program of the annual self denial meeting held in Willard hall, almost the entire body of temperance advocates again descended upon the mayor.

OFFICERS INVOLVED

Sanctioned Fights That Occurred at Naval Academy.

WAS TO BE NO INVESTIGATION

On Condition that Hazing Be Abolished, Superintendent Was Given to Understand Fighting Would Be Tolerated, If Sanctioned by First-Class Men.

Annapolis, Nov. 25.—At today's session of the court martial trying Midshipman Merriwether, in connection with death, after a fight, of Midshipman Branch, Jr., evidence was introduced by the defense to show that Branch harbored animosity against Merriwether and persecuted him, and also that the practice of fighting was known to, and in a manner connived at, by the high officials of the naval academy.

Prominent among the officers of the navy mentioned in this connection, is Admiral Wm. W. Brownson, now commanding the cruiser division of the North Atlantic fleet, who was the predecessor of Admiral James H. Sands, as superintendent of the naval academy; Captain Chas. J. Badger, who was succeeded as commandant of the midshipmen by the present commandant, Capt. P. Colvocoresses and Commander C. E. Colohan, deceased, who preceded Captain Badger in the same office.

It was testified that Admiral Brownson, while superintendent of the academy, had been promised that in consideration of the abolishing of hazing there would be no investigation of the fights, sanctioned by the first class men.

The important development of the day was the ordering by the Secretary of the Navy, the disinterment of Branch's body, for the purpose of holding an autopsy. It will be exhumed tomorrow.

QUICK TO SEIZE OPPORTUNITY

Yale Wins from Harvard by Taking Advantage of Error.

Cambridge, Nov. 25.—By quickness in seizing an opportunity afforded by a muffed punt, Yale today won the annual football game with Harvard by a score of 6 to 0. The error, which was made by Nichols, who had replaced Foster at left halfback, occurred near the close of the second half and but for it, as even Yale admits, the contest would probably have resulted as did those on the same field in 1897 and 1889, in no score on either side. Forty thousand people witnessed the game and the weather was glorious.

DRAGGED UNDER WHEELS AND LEGS GROUND OFF

Peculiar Accident at Centralia in Which Lucien Angel Sustains Injuries That Cost His Life.

Centralia, Wash., Nov. 25.—Lucien Angel, of Chehalis, had both legs cut off at the knee by a passenger train at the depot here at noon today. He died soon afterward at Dumon's hospital.

Several hundred people were at the depot, having gathered to meet the northbound and southbound trains, which pass here. Despite their presence, no one apparently saw just how the accident occurred, the wounded man's screams being the first intimation of what had happened.

By some it is supposed Angel was stealing a ride under the baggage car of train No. 7 when it backed up to allow train No. 8, bound in the opposite direction, to pass. Angel's foot caught in the dog of the switch, and he was wrenched from his position and ground under the wheels.

Another theory is that Angel tried to get on the first passenger from the wrong side, the vestibule door being closed, and fell beneath the car wheels. Angel was about 30 years old, and lived formerly at Houston, Mo. It is not known that he had any family.
