PORTLAND, April 25.—The hop market is active and holdings are being moved quite rapidly. Sales are recorded from 10 to 11 cents per pound. The Ladd & Reed lot, the largest remaining in the state, was sold yesterday. The Lallethale reported 10 1/2 cents and several other large transactions occurred from that to eleven cents. Stocks in growers' hands have been required to under 1000 pounds. The stocks remaining in Portland warehouses are less than 4000 pounds, according to an estimate received from a reliable source.
