



# DOWIE RETURNS TO ZION CITY

## GOVERNMENT'S MONEY NOT AVAILABLE FOR USE

Secretary Metcalf Announces Only \$300,000 Are Available of \$2,500,000 Appropriated By Congress for California Earthquake Sufferers.

## MAYOR SCHMITZ ASKS MILITARY TO REMAIN

GENERAL GREELEY INFORMS CITY AUTHORITIES THAT WAR DEPARTMENT DESIRES TO WITHDRAW TROOPS AND MAYOR AT ONCE ASKS THAT ARMY CONTINUE ASSISTANCE—SIGHTSEERS OVERRUN CITY.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—The amount of money on hand for immediate relief work and a continuance of military control were the two most important subjects at the meeting of the citizens' committee today. Both developed some interesting phases and left in the hands of the committee two things: the strictest economy in the expenditure of money and the urgent need of continued military assistance. The statement of chairman Pehlan of the finance committee, which was later endorsed by Secretary Metcalf, the representative of the President that only \$300,000 of the \$2,500,000 appropriated by congress are available, and that this sum represented the total financial assistance to be expected from that source, caused a decided sensation in the meeting.

**Strictest Economy Necessary.**  
When Metcalf himself corroborated the statement Pehlan simply said the strictest economy was necessary and the country should not be led to the belief that millions are on hand to relieve the destitute people. Both Metcalf and Dr. Edward Devine, volunteered to apprise Washington of the situation.

A letter from General Greely was read stating that while he was perfectly willing to continue military assistance that

the war department looked with doubt upon it and he could not sanction its use longer than was absolutely necessary. He asked for a written statement from the mayor that there might be no doubt on his part as to the need of the military forces.

**Mayor's Action Approved.**  
The mayor said the troops had given immeasurable assistance and will ask the committee to formally approve of his action in asking that the military to take charge and that the committee request that this control be continued. In accordance with the Mayor's idea the committee passed the motion unanimously. The influx of sightseers is adding trouble to the authorities and discomfort to those still residing in San Francisco. Thousands crowded the ferrie and block the streets and seriously interferes with the relief work. Today they overran the ruins of the buildings wherever there was a permit and were absolutely ruthless in their frantic efforts to seize upon some article of historic or intrinsic value and cart it away. Some of these thousands will doubtless be of great assistance in the expense of the relief committee thus needlessly adding to the already tremendous burden of stricken San Francisco.

### CONCLUDES HIS SPEECH.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Williams the minority leader in the house concluded his speech begun yesterday on the agricultural appropriations bill. He asked that he be not interrupted and generally his request was observed, but numerous questions were put to him.

## BRILLIANT RECORD PEOPLE IN TERROR

Americans Win Laurels at the Olympic Games.

PLEASED WITH TREATMENT

Greeks Treat American Athletes With Great Courtesy—Sheridan of Americans, Wins Sixteen Points.

ATHENS, April 28.—The feature of the week at the Olympic games was the brilliant record of the American Athletes. Sheridan of the Irish American Club especially distinguished himself. He won sixteen points in the games, five for the shot-put, five for throwing the discus, three for the standing broad jump, and three for putting the stone. The Americans are greatly impressed by the games. They are pleased with the Greeks, civilians and officials, who have been most kind in their treatment to the Americans. The keenness of interest in the sports was illustrated by the way that all the spectators cheered when an event would be concluded. There were only two events in the stadium today, the throwing of the javelin, and weight lifting. Thirty five thousand spectators were in attendance among them being King George and the princes. Their simple and kindly manner has gone straight to the hearts of all the visitors. The king and princes attended in inconspicuous uniforms, and have mingled with the crowds shaking hands and chatting with many. The Germans beat the Greeks in the final sword team contest.

### GOTCH WINS CHAMPIONSHIP.

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 28.—Frank Gotch, the wrestler tonight won the heavyweight championship, which has been in progress all winter in Canada, the finals being contested here. Fifty wrestlers, of all nations participated.

### SWEAR IN DEPUTIES.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—Nearly 400 men were sworn in as special police officers this afternoon. The city has been divided into thirty patrolling districts. Each man was given a star and a number with a card stating forth that he was a regular patrol authority. These men have simply volunteered their services for the good of the city, and each patrolling district in which he lives. Probably 2500 men will be sworn in. They have no connection with the police force.

### BANK ROBBERED.

SPOKANE, April 28.—A Kettle Falls despatch to the Spokesman Review says the safe of the local bank was opened by burglars last night and \$1,100 in cash taken. The outside combination was worked with a chisel. There is no clue to the robbers.

### POLICEMAN KILLED.

WARSAW, April 28.—At Czenstochowa in Russia Poland, a bomb was thrown at the carriage of the chief of police, when he was returning from a funeral. It exploded killing a policeman.

### NEGRO LYNCHED.

IKUA, Miss., April 28.—Will Brown, a negro was lynched tonight by citizens who hanged him to a railroad trestle for killing, W. L. Johnson a contractor of Corinth, Mississippi.

## "FIRST APOSTLE" ENTERS THE TOWN HE FOUNDED

Whiskered Prophet Greeted By Wife and Crowd of Women—Asserts He Has Committed No Crime to Be Ashamed of.

## VOLIVA DENOUNCES WHOLE DOWIE FAMILY

OVERSEER VOLIVA SAYS ENTIRE DOWIE FAMILY MUST BE SWEEPED OFF THE EARTH—IF DOWIE IS NOT INSANE HE SHOULD BE BRANDED AS A CHIMINAL—ELIJAH WILL PREACH TODAY IN TABERNACLE.

CHICAGO, April 28.—"I am glad to be home again," said John Alexander Dowie on entering Shiloh House and completing his much heralded entry into Zion. Mrs. Dowie wife of the Deposed "First Apostle" gave him a hearty welcome.

Dowie's return to Zion City was accompanied by much pomp and ceremony. He arrived at the station in a private care, but was met by a comparatively small crowd, mostly women.

In a brief speech he declared that every accusation against him was false and said he had done nothing of which he was ashamed. In a meeting tonight Voliva denounced Mrs. Dowie as well as the "First Apostle." "If she thinks she

can stand before this people without confessing her sins she is greatly mistaken. In some respects she is as great a sinner as Dowie," declared Voliva.

The lust of gold in her heart is as great as in his. I say that the whole Dowie family must be swept off the earth. For years they succeeded, and this people justified their lust, for clothes, in order to make a showing. If Dowie is not insane the only other words to brand him with is criminal." Voliva will use the college building tomorrow, while Dowie uses the tabernacle, it being the "First Apostle's" turn in accordance with the order of the court to use the big meeting house on alternate days.

### MURDERER SEEN.

Member of Posse Sees Man Emerge From Brush—Takes Shot Misses

PORTLAND, Ore., April 28.—A dispatch to this city from Woodburn, Or. says "Men tonight are patrolling the roads and doing sentry duty on the lookout for the murderer of Captain Henderson of that town, and Policeman Hanlon of Oregon City. This afternoon W. L. Jerman saw a man come from the brush some distance away and drink at a spring. He fired a shot but apparently missed his man, who after he had finished drinking hurried back into the brush."

### STILL RELIEF SUPPLIES.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—Supplies for the homeless and hungry sent by Philanthropic and charitable communities throughout the country are being sold on the streets by licensed peddlers,—that is licensed before the recent disaster. This is a startling condition of affairs and was reported to Chief Dinan this morning by department commanders from the various police districts. To meet the emergency Dinan directed that patrolmen be detailed, and mounted if necessary with instructions to arrest every man engaged in such traffic.

### MUSIC UNION PROTESTS.

NEW YORK, April 28.—German musicians employed on German steamships entering this port have been making considerable extra money in this city by playing at entertainments and in concert halls here while their ships were in port. The musical mutual protective union has entered a protest with the government. A committee of three called yesterday on collector of the Port Stranahan and stated that the Germans were violating the contract law.

Collector Stranahan referred the matter to Robert Watchorn, commissioner of immigration, who said he would institute an investigation.

## FRENCH GOVERNMENT CAN CONTROL THE STRIKERS

of a bomb Friday under a railroad bridge in a suburb of Paris and an attempt this evening of one hundred striking jewelers to penetrate the populous centers of the Place D'Opera for the purpose of making a demonstration before the great jewelry establishments in the Rue De Lax Paix.

## HUNDREDS OF ARMED MEN HUNTING FOR MURDERER

WOODBURN, Or., April 28.—Country-side about Woodburn is being patrolled tonight. A man being stationed at nearly every farm house for miles around in an effort to apprehend the man who shot sheriff Shaver and Captain Henderson today, who is believed to be Frank Smith, who escaped from the

Portland jail. Sheriff Culver has given up hope of corraling the man, and will now look to his being compelled by hunger to make himself known at one of the houses within which patrolmen are. The man has not been seen since his disappearance after the encounter early this morning.
