BACK TO RUSSIA.

CHICAGO, May 17.—Dr. Gregory Maxime, political fugitive from Russia, was due to arrive in Chicago last Sunday morning to address local advocates of a republican form of government in the empire, is believed by his followers to be on his way back to St. Petersburg, a prisoner in the hands of Russian secret service men.

Dr. Maxime, who was once president of the short lived republic made up of the Baltic provinces, was awaited here by Ivan Narodny a former secretary of State of the same republic who is now residing temporarily at the Saratoga Hotel. When he failed to appear Mr. Narodny got into communication with the revolutionary band in New York and learned last night that a man answering Maxime's description had been seen at a New York dock looked with three other men giving Russian names for European passage.

READS THE BIBLE.

Maniac Imprisons Five Men Two Days While He Reads Scriptures.

NEW YORK, May 17.—The Herald today says: Standing at the companionway of the yacht Atrous, owned by George W. Childs Drexel, of Philadelphia, tied up at South Brooklyn, John Neilsen, a seaman suffering from religious mania, with revolver in hand, compelled the little crew of five men to remain below deck from Tuesday evening until yesterday.

For eight hours Neilsen, by the light of a lantern, read passage after passage from the bible. The terrified men, unarmed, locked themselves in the cabin.

John Larsen, boatswain's mate, managed to make his escape from the yacht yesterday and telephoned the police. Six officers later overpowered Neilsen, who was sent to a hospital, for observation.

CONTEST CLOSES.

NEW YORK, May 17.—A contest for the election of a president of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers has closed with the choice of Professor Samuel Sheldon of the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute. Other officers elected were: Presidents: A. H. Armstrong, Schnectady; H. H. Humphrey, St. Louis; F. G. Baum, San Francisco; treasurer, George A. Hamilton, New York; and secretary, Ralph W. Pope, New York.

COURT ABOVE EXECUTIVE.

AUSTIN, Tex., May 17.—A majority of the court of criminal appeals yesterday held that a court can go behind the executive warrant and requisition issued by the Governor of a state. It was in the case of Mrs. Pearl Cheatham, from Texas, on a writ of habeas corpus. The lower court's order remanding her to the custody is reversed and she was ordered discharged, Judge Brooks dissenting. Mrs. Cheatham was supposed to have been guilty of embezzlement.

SEA-LEVEL CANAL

(Continued from page 1)

could destroy a lock canal much easier than a sea level canal with explosives. The ultimate final cost of the sea level canal as estimated by the majority is \$250,000,000, while the cost of the lock canal is regarded as uncertain. The minority of the band of consulting engineers estimated the cost at \$139,050,200 and to this the majority says should be added the interest on the extra cost of maintenance, the expenses of clearing the titles to the 118,000 acres of land that would be submerged by the central lake proposed by the lock plan, which, it is estimated, would make the total cost at least \$190,000,000. The cost of transferring the lock plan into a sea level canal after the former is completed is estimated at \$200,000,000.

Summary of Report.
In conclusion the majority says: "Your committee feels entirely confident that the board of consulting engineers selected to study this problem has submitted a plan that responds in every respect to the conditions stated above that the sea level can be realized in ten or twelve years at a cost not exceeding \$60,000,000 above that required by the construction of the multi-lock canal proposed by the minority."

REPLY ADOPTED.

Russian Lower House Adopts Its Reply to Speech From Throne.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 17.—The lower house of parliament finished the consideration of its reply to the speech from the throne, which was adopted, paragraph by paragraph, substantially as it came from the committee. The house then took a recess until 2 a. m. to permit the committee to prepare the final draft of the address. The debate ended sensationally with a discussion by M. Stakovatch to insert an appeal to the people to stop political assassination. The motion was rejected. When the parliament reconvened the address was adopted and the first great work of the lower house concluded.

REACH AGREEMENT.

CLEVELAND, May 17.—An agreement was reached today between the Lake Carriers' Association and the grain schooners employed on the Great Lakes. All the unions will accept the lake carriers' proposal.

BIG STEEL RAIL ORDERS.

PITTSBURG, May 17.—Since the order books of the various steel companies were opened two weeks ago, orders for a million tons of steel rails have been booked for delivery in 1907. It is estimated the total booked is more than 700,000 tons above the actual production in the United States in 1905.

BIG MEMBERSHIP.

PARIS, May 17.—At today's session of the world's conference of the Y. W. C. A., a report was read showing that in the United States there are 685 city and country branches with an aggregate membership of over 100,000.

CASTRO ONCE MORE.

NEW YORK, May 17.—The Associated Press learns from a source of information closely allied to the Venezuelan government that Castro will resume control of his office on May 23 and on that day will grant general amnesty to political prisoners.

PATHETIC INCIDENT

Sister Carries Dead Brother to County Hospital.

DID NOT KNOW HE WAS DEAD

Poor Girl Carries Dead Brother Two Miles to Hospital and Wants Him Treated—Takes Body to Morgue.

CHICAGO, May 17.—At the end of a weary two-mile walk, Rosa Goldberg, 8 years old, laid her one year old brother down at the county hospital yesterday and asked in broken English that he be admitted for treatment. The clerk looked at the baby's face and then at the girl in wonder. The infant was dead.

Rosa is the daughter of Joseph Goldberg, a shoemaker who came from Russia three months ago. The girl has been the only nurse to two younger children.

Yorke, the baby, was taken with measles and whooping cough and neighbors at length prevailed upon the family to have it taken to the hospital.

With the few English words at her command, Rosa inquired the way to the county institution. It required considerable explanation to persuade the girl that the baby was past medical aid and could not be revived. Then she quietly lifted up the body and started for the door, intending to return with it in her arms to her father's house. The hospital authorities with difficulty convinced her this would not do and that the body must be taken to the county morgue. Weeping she carried the child to the morgue on the south part of the group.

HOT IN CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, May 17.—Midsummer weather came to Chicago prematurely yesterday with the result that one man was overcome by the heat.

All records for May weather were broken when the thermometer registered 88 degrees at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. This was more than thirty degrees above the normal temperature for May 16.
