GANS AND NELSON NIN TRIM.
GOLDFIELD, Nev., Aug. 1.—The sale of seats for the Gans-Nelson fight today shows that an enormous crowd will witness the Labor Day battle. From San Francisco, Seattle, Los Angeles, Denver, Salt Lake, and from Chicago and other distant points delegations of the sporting fraternity will be on hand to see the lightweights contest for the championship.
Gans is impatient for the fight to begin, as he declares he wants to show the public what he can do at a weight that suits him. All reports from the Gans camp are to the effect that he is in splendid shape. He himself says he is in just as good trim as he was when he met Joe Wolcott in San Francisco when he stood the rushes of Walcott and landed at will on the Barbadoes demon.
Reports from the Nelson camp say the Dane is as fit as a fiddle and is an confident as Gans. He is said to have bet a large amount of ready money on himself and to have advised his friends to take the short end.

GOLDFIELD, Aug. 31.—A telegram from New York, stating that it was reported there that the Gans-Nelson fight was a fake and it was arranged for the Dane to win, caused great indignation here, where there is nothing to indicate anything crooked with the affair and the betting, with Gans the favorite at 10 to 8, seems to show no prearrangement. Gans himself is reported as betting heavily on himself, and Larry Sullivan, his local manager, is said to have Gans' authority to bet his share of the purse of \$10,000, on the negro to win. Gans, it is understood, will be well under the weight of 133 pounds and it is reported Nolan's discovery of this fact caused him to insist upon Gans weighing in with his fighting togs and Gans, after much argument, acceded to the demands of Nelson's manager.

QUEEN WILHELMINA'S BIRTHDAY.
THE HAGUE, Aug. 31.—Queen Wilhelmina received the congratulations of the foreign diplomats today on the occasion of her twenty-sixth birthday. The observance of the anniversary was quite general throughout Holland, though the people have not yet recovered from the gloom cast over the country by the recent announcement that the joyful anticipation of the Queen giving birth to an heir to the throne had again been frustrated.
Queen Wilhelmina succeeded to the throne on the death of her father in 1890 and was formally inaugurated sovereign of the Netherlands on Sept. 6, 1898. On Feb. 7, 1906, the young queen married Prince Henry of Mecklenburg-Schwerin. On two previous occasions her majesty has been prematurely confined, namely November, 1901, and September, 1902, each time the hopes of the country being disappointed. Should the queen die without offspring the House of Orange, which has been associated with Holland since the eleventh century, will become extinct.

ASSESSMENTS ARE LARGE.
CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—Cook county's assessments on personal property amounts to \$574,897,550, full value, or \$174,979,510 assessed value, according to figures compiled by the clerks of the board of review last night. This is by far the largest valuation ever recorded for the county and an increase of approximately 39 per cent over the reviewers' total of last year, on which taxes were collected last spring.
The gain was due largely to the increases made upon the big estates, that in the past had not been scheduled, and to the belief of the board at anything like their full valuation and to the increases made by the reviewing body in the personal valuations against the large corporations.
The assessed value of the real estate in the county is placed at \$327,692,745, and the full value at \$2,213,361,275.

PATHETIC LETTER.
SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 31.—Theodore Thurman, who fled from Tyler, Wash., Sunday after killing Mark Lipscombe in a saloon quarrel, is believed to have drowned himself in Fishtrap Lake. Geo. Bower, Thurman's son-in-law, states that a sack containing Thurman's knife, ring, \$61 and a note was given to him by an unknown man. The note is to Thurman's wife, says:
"Darling Mary: By the time you get this I'll be in the bottom of Fishtrap. There is no use of me trying to live here. Am hungry and wet. You know it. Good-bye for ever."

LEAVES FOR VALPARAISO.
GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Aug. 31.—The French cruiser Catina left this port yesterday for Valparaiso, touching at Callao for coal.

NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD.
The annual report of Chief Labor Inspector Davies of Illinois shows that in twelve years the number of children employed in the State in gainful occupations has been reduced 80 per cent.

Arrangements are being made by the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor to mail literature explaining trades unionism to the farmers of that State.

The 700 men employed in the Great Western shops at Oelwein, Iowa, who went on strike because of the discharge of seven members of the shop committee, won a complete victory and all were reinstated.

The letter carriers are going to locate their home for aged and infirm mail carriers at Colorado Springs, adjoining the Union Printers' home.

Organized labor of Kenton and Campbell counties, Kentucky, has established a bank at Covington.

The labor unionists of Pittsburg are going to erect a Labor Temple to cost \$100,000. Each union subscribing for the stock will be entitled to one director on the board.

The report presented by Secretary-Treasurer Bramwood to the recent convention of the International Typographical Union at Colorado Springs showed that the financial transactions for the year just ended were much larger than those for any previous year in the history of the union. This was due chiefly to the benefits disbursed during the great eight-hour strike.

SELF DEFENSE ALLEGED.
MISSOULA, Aug. 31.—At Sales tonight Alvin McKinney shot and killed F. Flynn, a wiring man. There was a long standing quarrel and Flynn is alleged to have attacked McKinney with a knife, the latter firing in self-defense.

BOX IS OPENED.
CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—The private strong box belonging to Paul O. Stensland, was pried open today and found to contain blank warrant deeds signed by "dummies" employed by the banker.
