## BARNES MUST HANG

Murderer of William Graham Will Die Next Tuesday.

### EFFORTS MADE FOR PARDON

Friends Try to Save Condemned Man, But It Is Not Likely That Governor Will Interfere With the Execution.

It is entirely improbable that Governor Chamberlain will interfere with the execution of the sentence in the case of John C. Barnes, sentenced to be hanged for the murder of William Graham.

Within the past week a strong effort was made to have the governor pardon Barnes on the grounds that the corpus delicti was not proven, at the trial, and there was no motive shown for the murder. The application for the pardon was signed by several of the trial jurors. Governor Chamberlain has received from Judge L. T. Harris, who presided at the trial, and also from the district attorney, who reviewed the evidence, who also state that the signatures of the jurors were obtained by misrepresentation. The judge and the district attorney say the murder was a cold-blooded one, and they recommend that the law be allowed to take its course.

On the first day of May of last year the bones of a human skeleton were found in a burning pile of logs near Glendale, Douglas county, and nearby was found a belt belonging to the murdered man. Barnes was found to have the dead man's pistol, knife, nugget of gold and diamond ring. Other strong circumstantial evidence was given at the trial.

Barnes had a bad record. He served time in the penitentiary for larceny. After his release, he was again sentenced to 20 years for a criminal assault on his half-sister, a girl of 12 years. After serving seven years of this time he was pardoned by Governor Sylvester Pennoyer. Governor Pennoyer was criticised for using executive clemency in this case.

Unless something unforeseen arises to prevent it, Barnes will be executed at the penitentiary next Tuesday between noon and 12:30 o'clock.

Some Army Changes—The arrival at Fort Stevens of Captain Percy Willis as the relieving officer of Captain Gardner, just departed for San Francisco and the Philippines, recalls the fact of other pending changes in the military roster of the Pacific coast, now imminent, but communicated to the Astorian by a friend in San Francisco, to-wit: Assistant Surgeon F. H. McKeon, U. S. A. (now on duty in the federal marine service at this city), to San Francisco, for duty in the government hospital there, as assistant to Surgeon H. W. Austin, commanding there; Passed Assistant Surgeon Mervin W. Glover, now at Vancouver and Victoria, to special duty, in the examination of aliens at this port, in succession of Dr. Baylis H. Earle; Passed Assistant Surgeon John M. Holt, now second in command at the San Francisco hospital, to succeed Dr. Glover at Vancouver; Dr. Earle, formerly of this port and post, goes to Charleston, S. C., in charge of the quarantine stations there, four in number, and with an assistant at each of them. And thus the endless chain of official change and progress goes forward.

### FROM GRAVE TO ALTAR.

Kansas City Man Lies in Family Vault Vault for Eight Months.

A dispatch from Denver, Colo., Tuesday says: On Jan. 12 last, Frederick J. Harvey was declared dead by Kansas City physicians. The papers published death notices, his funeral was held and his body placed in the family vault. About the middle of May the body was removed to the home of his parents. On September 4 Harvey came to life, and the next day married Miss Lilly Godfrey, of Denver. They left at once on a wedding tour.

Mr. Harvey is the son of Barnard Harvey and grandson of the deceased Frederick Harvey, the millionaire owner of all the eating-houses on the Santa Fe lines and most of those on the Frieso. The family is well known throughout the United States. Although all animation and respiration had ceased, his affianced wife, Miss Godfrey, would have it that he was not dead. She wept and moaned, took the death watch upon herself and would not leave the casket until it was placed on a marble slab next the casket of his father and aunt in the family's tightly closed vault.

For four months Mr. Harvey lay in the company of his dead ancestors, until Miss Godfrey, crazed by the feeling which grew upon her that her beloved was not dead, returned to Kansas City and begged and pleaded with the family to accompany her, and when the vault was opened they were astonished to find the coffin open, an oversight of the undertaker.

So lifelike did the body appear that they took it to the Harvey house and attended it daily until September 4, when Harvey suddenly sat up and proved to be in such good physical condition that he and Miss Godfrey were married the next day and departed on a wedding tour, being due in Denver next week.

Fires a Shot—Patrolman Emslie Houghton caused some excitement yesterday afternoon among pedestrians, and incidentally lost a few pounds in weight, when he chased a "dope" fiend and sneak thief for several blocks and finally compelled him to "heave to" by firing a shot from his revolver across the fugitive's bows. When caught the fellow, who gave the name of Frank Clem, was "all in," and submitted without protest to being removed to jail. In police court, Judge Anderson imposed a fine of \$300 or 100 days in jail on the prisoner, which he remitted on Clem's promise to leave the city on the next train.

Its manner of celebration is set forth in Lev. xvi, xxiii: 26-32; Num. xxix: 7-11. It was a great day of humiliation before Jehovah on account of sin, and its observance was required of all the people on pain of being cut off from the congregation of Israel.
