STRANDED IREDALE
NEWS ITEMS

VESSEL SAID TO BE TAKING WATER—NO DATE SET FOR COURT OF SURVEY—LLOYDS' REPRESENTATIVE SENT FOR.

At last accounts the stranded Iredale was lying easy and safe on her mud berth at Clatsop. Captain Lawrence and his officers are standing by her and will remain there until the board of survey shall assemble either in this city, or in Portland.

Yesterday Vice Consul P. L. Cherry sent for one of Lloyds' surveyors to come here and advise with and assist Captain Lawrence in such ways as may prove needful.

It was discovered yesterday that the vessel was taking water perceptibly; how, where or why, have not yet been surely ascertained, but it is thought that her continual heavy pounding on her anchor chains, and the abrasions and indentures consequent thereupon are responsible for it.

James E. Laidlaw, representing the house of Frank Waterhouse company, arrived in the city yesterday to visit the vessel and meet the captain and his officers. He is a son of English Consul at Portland, James Laidlaw.

There is no news yet of the formation personnel, place or date of the survey, but the matter will probably come to a head very shortly.

Representatives of the wrecked vessel entertain some hope of saving her yet, and it is said, unless the winter storms shall do her further and conclusive damage, that definite steps will be taken in the spring to float her and bring her into port here, for rejuvenation.

Pending the sitting of the court of survey, Captain Lawrence has invoked the aid of Captain Wicklund and his life-saving crew in maintaining a strict and steady watch on the bark to prevent molestation and thievery.

Drowned at Point Adams—Malcolm Grider of Warrenton was drowned yesterday morning at Point Adams close to the scene of the wreck of the Peter Iredale. He, in company with several companions from Warrenton went down to see the wreck and at low tide boarded the ship. Before they left the tide began coming in very strong and the party started for shore. Grider is a cripple and was unable to stem the tide and was drowned. Owing to darkness setting in his body was not recovered till yesterday morning, when it was found on the beach and brought to Warrenton. Grider has been a resident of Warrenton the past ten years and at one time conducted a store there. He was 26 years of age. The funeral will take place this afternoon.

Penitentiary Candidates—The police arrested two boys late Thursday night for violating the curfew ordinance, although a more serious charge was filed against them yesterday. They gave their names at the police station as Henry Baack and Fred Munson. Baack is a resident of Astoria and Munson is a San Francisco tough. They went to a Japanese restaurant on Bond street, created a disturbance, overturned the tables and were fired out by the proprietor. They remained in the vicinity for some time, waiting for the proprietor to come out, when they intended to assault him. While waiting they were picked up by the police. When searched a piece of gas pipe was found on Munson, whom the police are inclined to think is a hold-up artist. They will be examined before county Judge Trenchard today and probably committed to the state reform school.

Police Court—Two Chinamen who had left \$25 each with Chief Gammal for engaging in the fan-tan business, forfeited their money in the police court yesterday. Florence Gordon, arrested by the police on a charge of being drunk, left \$10 bail and her case was continued until tomorrow, when she will contest the allegations of the complaint. Grace Lewis appeared in court and listened to the reading of two complaints against her, one charging her with being a vagrant, and the other of enticing unsophisticated young men to her apartments on the Rue-de-Concomley. F. D. Winton appeared for the young lady and asked until tomorrow to plead to the soft impeachment, which was granted. Miss Lewis deposited \$50 bail for her appearance.
