PRESIDENT OBJECTS.

Not Customary to Quote Private Conversations.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The following statement touching on the quoted conversations with the President, was made public at the White House yesterday:

For many years it has been the invariable practice never to attempt to quote a private conversation with the President. It has been found that as a matter of fact, the man who quotes such a conversation usually misquotes it, whether consciously or unconsciously and such an alleged conversation is under no circumstances to be held as calling for an explanation or denial by the President. The President is responsible only for what he himself says in public or for what he writes or for what he explicitly authorizes the proper government officials to state in his behalf.

BEGIN PROCEEDINGS.

Attorney General Ready to Prosecute the Standard Oil Company.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Special Counsel Morrison Kellogg, having in charge the investigation of the Standard Oil company, held a conference today with Mr. Purdy, assistant to the attorney general. Another conference will be held Monday. It is believed that the attorney general will be ready late in the coming week to announce whether or not he will begin proceedings against the company for a violation of the Sherman anti-trust act.

LIGHT OPERA.

John Court Has Secured New Eastern Attractions.

SEATTLE, Nov. 10.—John Court, theatrical manager, has returned from the East with the announcement of what he claims to be a rich discovery in light opera, written by P. J. Dugan, a lawyer of Pueblo, Colo., with music by Hermann Frederick Gruendler. It is called "La Cartouche," or "The Vagabonds." The scene is laid at a village near Paris in 1850. Mr. Court says he will put the opera on next season in a cast of sixty people.

LAND ENTRIES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The total number of land entries for the first quarter of the fiscal year of 1907 was 53,626, an increase of 12,356 over first quarter of the fiscal year of 1906. The total receipts for the first quarter of the fiscal year 1907 was \$2,152,004, an increase of \$785,656 over the same quarter last year.

NEW AMBASSADOR.

Great Britain Will Send Mr. Rice to United States.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The Times says it was ascertained in this city last night that Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice would probably be the next ambassador to this country from Great Britain. As far as could be learned the British foreign office has not yet definitely decided on the appointment, but of all those mentioned for the office, Mr. Spring-Rice is regarded as the most probable appointee.

Mr. Spring-Rice is at present in Persia, having succeeded Sir A. H. Hardinge at Teheran. Before that he was first secretary of the embassy at St. Petersburg. He was born in 1859 and was educated at Eton and Balliol, Oxford.

Mr. Spring-Rice is comparatively a young man for the post at Washington. If he succeeds Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, his promotion will be due in some part at least to the fact that he is on friendly terms with President Roosevelt. In 1904 he married Florence, daughter of Sir Frank Langdale.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The first batch of English school teachers brought to this country by Alfred Moseley, the English philanthropist, for the purpose of studying educational methods in this country, will arrive tonight on the steamer New York. They will be met at the pier by Mr. Moseley and a committee of teachers from the public schools of this city.

RIVERS AND HARBORS.

Convention of National Congress to Be Held in December.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The national rivers and harbors congress, which was organized in Washington last January, is preparing to hold a second convention on December 6 and 7. Arrangements are being completed and invitations have been sent out. The purpose of the forthcoming convention is to demonstrate to Congress that a sentiment has arisen in favor of increased and regular river and harbor appropriations. Business men, representing commercial bodies, river improvement associations, maritime exchanges, chambers of commerce and other organized bodies from every city in the union are expected to be present. Congress will be invited to attend the session of the body and resolutions will be presented asking that \$50,000,000 be appropriated annually for river and harbor improvements.

In addition to sending out 10,000 invitations to the governors of states, mayors of cities and commercial organizations, one of the members of the executive committee, A. J. Fox of Arkansas, is personally visiting the large cities in order to explain fully the importance of having representatives present. Mr. Fox is now in New York in pursuance of his mission.

MUSIC BY PHONE.

Music Played by Electrical Vibrations a Success.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Dr. Thaddeus Cahill's invention for producing music by electrical vibrations, as one would telephone, called the "Telharmonium," was exhibited last night at the Cafe Martin. To produce the vibrations, a set of elaborate machinery and electric appliances have been installed. There is a set of 145 alternating current dynamos, which make vibrations varying from sixteen to eighteen thousand a second. These currents are passed through "tone mixers," and are released by a keyboard not unlike the keyboard of a pipe organ. The keyboard is played by a musician, and the electric currents give the vibrations required to produce the music desired. At present there are two keyboards which represent a flute and a horn. Two more are to be put in at once and the effect will be that of four instruments played together. The music can be transmitted through a telephone.
