

UNSOLVED MYSTERY

New York Police Confronted With a Baby Murder.

FOUND IN A BABY CARRIAGE

Body of Infant Found in a Baby Carriage with a Walking Cane, Which is Supposed to Figure in the Case.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—In the case of the child found in a baby carriage at 99th and Third avenue on Saturday evening, and believed to have been strangled, the police find themselves confronted by another murder case which will pass, in all probability, into the archives of unsolved mysteries. They now believe that the leaving of the body with a man's engraved walking cane in the carriage was another step in revenge on the part of a man who is supposed to figure in the case.

The baby carriage was not new. One theory of the police is that the child was killed outside the city and brought here for abandonment. After an examination of the child by Coroner Harburger and his physician, Dr. O'Hanlon, yesterday, they said they believed the child had been strangled. An autopsy will be held today.

The detectives are working on the theory that some time either on Thursday or Friday, the baby was strangled. There passed many hours in which those in the crime took counsel as to how they should rid themselves of the evidence of the crime. They chose the easiest way. Washing the body of the baby and dressing it, they wheeled it in the perambulator to the corner of 99th street and Third avenue early Saturday night and left it there in view of the hurrying Saturday night crowd.

Though the police believe the cane left behind was a blind, they hunted yesterday for the name of C. A. Gassert, the name inscribed on the plate below the crook of the cane. Four men answering to the name of Gassert, were found in Manhattan yesterday, one in Brooklyn and one in Newark. All, after examination, were dismissed from the field of possibilities.

HER TENTH MILL.

A new band sawmill, with a cutting capacity of not less than 60,000 feet of lumber per day, will be erected in this city by the Crech Bros. Lumber company. Messrs. John S. Crech and F. X. Crech were in this city on Tuesday and secured title to one of the best sites on the Willapa river, which begins at a point 100 feet west of the point at the junction of the Willapa and South Fork rivers and extends down the bank for a distance of 1,700 feet, and is technically described as follows: the westerly portion of lot 8, section 24-14-9; on the north side of the railroad

track. Thirteen hundred feet of water front on the opposite side of the Willapa river was also secured for boom purposes. The main mill building will be 50x200 feet and its general arrangement will be similar to the Raymond Lumber company's plant. The mill will be strictly modern throughout and so arranged that its capacity may be increased to over 100,000 daily later on.—Raymond Herald.
