Trappers' Meeting—Pursuant to a call, a meeting of the trappers and sealers of the Columbia river was held at Chinook yesterday. A number of sealers went over from Astoria yesterday to attend the meeting. It is stated that the object of the meeting is for the purpose of forming an organization of those engaged in fishing on the Columbia River, and to make suggestions for needed legislation to the fishing industry from the legislatures of Oregon and Washington. The delegation that went over from Astoria expected to return last evening, but owing to the prevailing wind storm they were prevented from doing so. No report of the meeting was received.
