PURCHASE COMPLETED.

Site for Fish Hatchery on McKenzie Bought by State.

Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen who has been spending several days in Eugene, returned yesterday. He reports the purchase of the Blighon estate on the McKenzie river near Eugene, to be used for the site of a salmon hatchery. This deal has been pending for two years, having been delayed by the hesitancy of some of the heirs of the former owner in selling. The outdoor hatchery which has been maintained for the past three years there has done good work, handling six million eggs last year. The permanent hatchery will be able to take care of from five to ten million eggs.

Mr. Van Dusen added that he has just received word from the different hatcheries that the recent floods had not done the damage anticipated, little loss being sustained by the plants.

Much of the property is owned by Chinese firms and individuals. The tract includes the Chinese theatre and Chinese joss house in which most of the Chinese worship is held. It has long been considered the most picturesque spot in the city.
