

NATIONAL MATCH

Annual Shoot Will Begin Next August in Ohio.

KRAG RIFLES WILL BE USED

Adoption of New Springfield Would Give Undue Advantage to Militia of Some States—Ammunition of Various Makes.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—The decision of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice to hold the new annual matches on the Ohio State Range, at Camp Perry, on Lake Erie, has met with substantially unanimous approval.

There was considerable discussion of the place of holding the matches, but no difference of opinion. The Board held that as far as possible the matches should be shot in different parts of the country where suitable ranges could be procured.

The meeting of the Board was fully attended, among those present being General Robert Shaw Oliver, Assistant Secretary of War and President of the Board; Generals Roe, of New York, Hullin, of Texas, Spencer, of New Jersey, Frye, of Massachusetts, Critchfield, of Ohio, Harries, of District of Columbia, Wahser, of New

Jersey and Young of Illinois; Colonels Walter Cooney, of Georgia, and T. F. Cooke, of Iowa. From the regular establishment were General W. P. Hall, Military Secretary, and Captain Crete Hutchinson, U. S. A., and Captain Sims U. S. N., Mr. J. A. Haskell and General George Wingate, of New York, were also in attendance.

The order of firing in the matches was changed so that hereafter the Skirmish Run will come first instead of last. It will be followed by Rapid Fire and then the Slow Fire. Under this arrangement it is expected that all chance of improper marking or shooting on the wrong target will be eliminated.

The question of prizes will be left in the hands of the committee on prizes but the amount of money to be distributed will probably be as large as last year, although there may be a different arrangement of the money. The appointment of an executive officer was left to the Secretary of War. Among those suggested for the positions are General Winfield Scott Edgerly, Colonel Phil Reade, Lt. Colonel Terrey, Lt. Colonel Irons, and Lt. Colonel R. K. Evans.

Ammunition for preliminary practice and for use in the matches will be purchased at the same time by the Ordnance Department under proper conditions and inspection. No hand-leader ammunition of any kind can be used in the National Matches but machine-made ammunition of the Frankfort arsenal, the Winchester Repeating Arms Company, the Union Metallic Cartridge Company, the Peters Cartridge Company and the U. S. Cartridge Company, may be used if bought by the United States, these being all the manufacturers who make .30 caliber cartridges for the Krag.

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
