

ON SHIP AND SHORE

Armeria is Due in Port This Morning.

ROANOKE HERE FROM SOUTH

Brodick Castle Goes Over the Bar for Valparaiso—Salvador and Abbie Sail For San Francisco—Odds and Ends of Marine News.

The schooner Susie M. Plummer was among the get-aways for the Bay City, from this port yesterday.

The British ship Brodick Castle, grain laden for Valparaiso, Chill, made it out over the bar yesterday noon.

The schooner Abbie went to sea and San Francisco, yesterday, with 150,000 feet of good Oregon pine as a cargo.

The schooner Salvador, from Rainier with 460,000 feet of lumber, went to sea yesterday noon on the hawsers of the Wallula.

The steamer Washington arrived in from Port Oxford yesterday and went on up the river. She will load lumber for the return trip to California.

The Callender office reports that the Alliance will be down here on Wednesday morning next early, outward bound for Coos Bay points. She will go no further south than that, this season.

T. A. Shute, representing the owners of the British ship Galena, left yesterday morning for Port Gamble, with two of his apprentices, the remaining four having missed the train, and will follow today.

The steamer Lurline, is doing business at the old stand in the same old

fashion. She went up to Portland on time last evening with a good business upstairs and down.

The Columbine has returned from her flying trip to Yaquina Bay and is just in time to greet the Armeria, with whose present captain, Captain Richardson, of the Columbine, dined on the day the latter left New York, on his voyage around the horn with the Columbine.

The steamship Roanoke arrived in from her California ports at 5:30 o'clock last evening, with forty people in her cabins, one of whom, John Anderson, was billed for the city. Purser Mann reports an ideal trip up the coast, in fact a regular Summer voyage, with not a sea-sick passenger on board. She laid here until midnight and then went on the metropolis and will return down on Wednesday morning next, at an early hour.

Sometime today the handsome United States light-house tender, Armeria, from San Francisco, will enter this port and become the flag-ship of the light-house squadron on this coast, with Captain William E. Gregory on her bridge hence-forward. The Heather came down from Portland yesterday, and it is presumed that Commander J. P. Werlich, U. S. N. commanding this department and district, will be here today to attend the function of transfer. Captain P. J. Brynes, formerly master of the Manzanita, will succeed Captain Gregory in the command of the Heather.

The Armeria will have charge of light-house matters generally on the Pacific and will visit all stations in these seas. She is the largest of the vessels in this department of the government service, the fastest and the most powerful. She was built at Camden, N. J., in 1890; is of 1,052 gross tonnage, and 631 net tonnage; her length is 211 feet, her beam 34.7 feet, her draft 17.6 feet, and her indicated horse-power, 1,400. So it will be seen that she is, by far, the biggest thing in her line around here, in this, or any other country's service. She is named after the Sea-Pink, or Tariff, as told in these columns ten days ago. She will find a cordial welcome awaiting her in this port.

DAY OF RECKONING AHEAD

COLUMBIA COUNTY NOT ADVISED
County Court There Has Not Seen a Copy of the Port of Columbia Bill.

The county court of Columbia went into regular session for March, yesterday, and Judge Trenchard, of this county took a notion he would interview the county judge there, as to the official estimate held in that body on the Port of Columbia bill, and called that gentleman up by telephone to make the inquiry. He was astonished to receive a reply that the court had not seen a copy of the bill nor heard

anything about it, that it was not under public discussion at all up there and that the people generally, were, apparently, conscious of the thing.

Judge Trenchard told his colleague some things about it and the popular estimate of it down this way, and the Columbia official at once indicated that his court would get in touch with the situation, and seek the district attorney in the premises. So there is likely to be something doing up that way in a few days.
