**Smith Resigns—**

Captain W. E. Smith has resigned his post as inspector in the customs service to take effect April 14.

**Weather Conditions—**

After the southeast storm of Wednesday, April Third, Weather Forecaster Beale predicted a Southwest storm for yesterday and as a result navigation over the bar was impracticable owing to the extreme roughness.

**Night Inspector—**

The experimental plan of having a night inspector for the accommodation of vessels desiring to clear or enter at night or early morning has been ordered continued until May 1, when a final disposition of the matter will be made.

**For Sunday Next—**

County Clerk J. C. Clinton yesterday issued the license that means years of happiness for Mr. Ole Stone and Miss Kristine Aspensen, of this city. Their wedding will transpire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jens Jacobsen, on Irving Avenue, on Sunday next.

**West Side Institute—**

Miss Emma Warren, Count Superintendent of Schools will leave on the noon train today for Hammond where she will take part in the West Side school institute that has become such a decided feature over there. The session will be held all day tomorrow, and promises to be very interesting.

**Realty Sale Confirmed—**

The sale of lots 27 in block 30 of Hill's First Addition to Astoria and the south half of 5 in block 39 of the Port of Upper Astoria, to Joseph Ansel, for the sum of \$1,430, by the executrix of the estate of the late Peter Nufer, was confirmed in the probate court yesterday, by Judge Tronchard, and due conveyance ordered to be made.

**Son Fined, Father Held—**

The matter of the larceny charge preferred in Justice Goodman's court as against John Robinson and Quincy Robinson, by President Harrison, of the Pacific Iron Works, for the lifting of certain chattels from the stranded ship Peter Iredale, was brought up yesterday morning, and the son, Quincy, pleaded guilty as was indicated he would on Wednesday, but the father, John Robinson, reneged, and was bound over in the sum of \$50 for further hearing in the premises. His bond requires his presence in court at any time he shall be summoned.

**Adair Franchise—**

The Ways and Means Committee of the Council together with City Attorney Abercrombie discussed with S. D. Adair, the proposed street car ordinance on Wednesday. The Committee insisted upon a \$2500 deposit providing for failure to complete the construction on the time specified. Six months in which to accept the franchise after its passage by the Council and a deposit of only \$1000 was asked for by Mr. Adair. The Committee will hold further deliberations before submitting its recommendation to the Council.

**Police Court—**

P. L. Rhinart, charged with being drunk and disorderly and with assaulting the night clerk, Tom Daykin of the Parker House, on Tuesday evening. The case was continued from Wednesday in order that additional testimony could be produced. In court yesterday he was found guilty and fined \$5.

Frank McCanness, well dressed and claiming to be a gentleman, was arrested on a drunk and disorderly charge for cursing and creating a disturbance in a residence on Commercial street, Wednesday night. He forfeited his bail of \$20 rather than face the court.

The total bail forfeitures yesterday amounted to \$125. \$100 on gambling charges and the \$25 from drunk and disorderly.

**Home Once More —**

H. B. Parker, the octogenarian traveler, of this city, has returned from his recent explorations in Southern California, and is at his desk at the Parker House, as usual. He enjoyed his outing some, but not as he usually does, the weather being against his customary outdoor pursuits. He is no house plant, and enjoys the sunshine and hill climbing and hustling around where he can see things and people, and therefore he comes back to Astoria where these things are to be had for the mere effort of going after them. He is in fine health and good for another trip. Captain E. B. Parker, his son, is due to go off on a month's journey pretty soon, and will likely go as far east as Boston, and take in everything of interest en route, on two lines of transcontinental travel.

**COMMISSIONERS ARE STILL BUSY**

COUNTY COURT ACTIVELY ENGAGED ON ROAD AND BRIDGE MATTERS LIQUOR LICENSES ISSUED—REPORTS FILED.

The county commissioners' court went into session yesterday morning with a good list of affairs laid out for their consideration and put in the day dispatching the county business in deft style.

A liquor license was ordered to issue in favor of Anton Kullis, he paying the necessary \$400 for the privilege.

In the matter of the application of W. W. Johnson and others for permission to construct a logging railway across certain of the county roads in Section 1, 7-6-West, it was noted that they had failed to file the necessary indemnity bond, and the clerk was directed to write to the supervisor or road district No. 11, asking if the petitioners had made an attempt to cross the road at an point, and on receipt of an answer, to advise the court without delay.

In the matter of the county draw bridge across the Little Walluski, the court announced that it had examined the structure and that it was not safe for travel and not wide enough to admit the passage of vessels, and an order was made directing the county road master to secure the services of Andrew Johnson, and that he proceed to rebuild said bridge and widen said draw 24 feet.

The monthly report of the county road master for the month of March was received by the court, read and ordered to the files.

The court made an order approving the plat of the townsite of Harriman, presented by its proprietors.

It was ordered that bids for the repair of the plank road from Warrenton to Flavel, so as to make the same fit for travel during the year 1907.

In the matter of the road from Warrenton to Flavel, the clerk was directed to write at once to George Warren asking him to present to the court without delay his plans for the replanking of the same, upon that section of the highway from where it crosses the railway tracks by his gate to the small building below, and to advise the court as to the amount of lumber necessary for the work.

Road petitions from L. Myllenbeck et al; and from Otto Johnson et al, were read the first time and continued until today for second reading.

An order was made directing the issuance of a liquor license in favor of D. Palangos, at Clifton precinct No. 2 upon the receipt of the sum of \$400 from Mr. Palangos to cover same.

The matter of the equipment and repair of the Elk Creek road was taken up by the court, and an order was sent to the records, showing that the court has already spent a large sum of money on this particular road and attention of all concerned to the fact that it will cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000 to put the road in the condition it deserves to be in, stating further that the court is not in position this year, to undertake this large expenditure but that if the taxpayers will make any effort the court do all it may to assist in the work, for the time being, to put it through having due regard for its importance in relation to the summer resorts depending upon it as an avenue.

J. A. Montgomery filed an acceptable bond in the sum of \$2,500 yesterday with the court. In behalf of his pending contract with the county to do the plumbing of the new court house, and the same was duly filed.

The court then adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning.


