WATERFRONT ITEMS

New Craft Joins the Astoria Fleet the Schooner Evie.

TRAMP FLEET ENTERS PORT

Sotayama Here, After More Cement—Columbia Comes In With Good Business—Lurline Takes Away Group Of Astorians—Wharf Items Yesterday.

The motor schooner Evie, recently purchased by Sampel Elmore & Co. of this city, for the sum of \$15,500, arrived in this port from Seattle under command of Captain Latham, of the Gerald C. her motor being in charge of Engineer Deane of the same vessel and the Gerald's crew working her over. She left Seattle on Thursday evening and did the trip in 48 hours, and according to Captain Latham, is a "howling success" for the business she is destined for, attending to the coast canner interests of the boats whose flag she will fly. The Astorian begs to correct the dimensions of the Evie, heretofore published, as follows: Tonnage, 82, gross and 78, net; length, 71-1-2 feet; breadth, 24 feet; depth, 13 feet. She carries a crew of three people, and was built at Alameda, California in 1891.

The steamer Lurline was on her regular schedule, once again last night. She went up at 7 o'clock, with the following people booked for Portland and way points: R. W. McLeod, E. B. Britton, L. G. West, Captain Al. Betts went up to Kalama to bring down the steamer Northland today, and another group of Astorians went out on the Lurline, last evening, to be gone for two or three weeks, namely, A. R. Cyrus, Dr. T. L. Barr, Rev. C. C. Barick, J. E. Johnson, Sharon Turner, and Al. Schroeder. They are bound for Lake County, where each and all expect to take up homestead claims in that fine section of Oregon.

The motor schooner Sotayama has arrived in port from the Umpqua River, after 2,200 more barrels of S. P. cement and is taking on cargo at the O. R. & N. pier. She will get away about Tuesday next.

The British steamship Kirkies, entered port yesterday from San Fran-

cisco, and went on to Portland yesterday morning.

The Norwegian steamship Sidsra came in over the bar yesterday morning from the Bay City and left up for Portland about noon.

The good, old Columbia came in yesterday morning at 11 o'clock with lots of freight and plenty of people including nearly forty Japs, who disembarked here under contract for the Alaska Fisheries and canneries. The Columbia on her outward trip from Portland on Monday, will arrive down in the day-time and leave out on the new schedule.

The Warren Packing Company's Alaska ship, the Berlin, is down from Gobleland ready to sail for Nushagak along with the ships St. Nicholas and John Currier, and the fleet is expected to clear from here about the middle of this week.

Charlie Fowler has returned from his trip to Portland, whither he went to meet with the traffic men on Friday last, to amend the rail and river tariffs. Just what he accomplished will be announced in a few days. Mr. Fowler says he came home on the "Great Northern" express on Friday night. It is not the "A. & C." with him, any longer.

The steamer F. A. Kilburn came down yesterday at high noon and departed over the bar for Eureka and San Francisco.

The steamer Casco entered port yesterday evening and kept on up the river, presumably for Portland.

The fine oil steamer Argyle came in from the Bay City yesterday morning and went on to the metropolis without delay here.
