PORTLAND, May 13.—While the California crop is large the failure of the railroads to transport the shipments of oranges consigned to Front street merchants causes a strong demand for the yellow fruit. The delay in shipping also applies to produce as well. Demand for bananas is for excess of supply and has been for months.

CHARLES HASWELL DEAD.

NEW YORK, May 13.—Charles Haines Haswell, one of the best known civil and marine engineers in the country, is dead at his home here. He was 95 years of age. In the building of the early ships for the U. S. navy many of Mr. Haswell's constructive plans, improvements and inventions were made. He was the first chief engineer and engineer in chief in the navy from 1834 to 1851.

ARMED WITH CAMERA AND GUN

Unique Experiment To Secure Better Enforcement of Laws Relating To Cruelty to Animals and Children—Deputies Cause Numerous Arrests and Prosecutions.

NASHUA, N. H.—The unique experiment of the state of New Hampshire to secure better enforcement of the laws regarding cruelty to animals and children in appointing two women as deputy sheriffs, armed with all the authority usually vested in deputy sheriffs, seemed to have fully demonstrated its success by the reports being made by Mrs. Jennie P. Powers of Keene, and Miss Jennie M. Kendall, of Nashua, and will lead, it is believed, to a number of such appointments.

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Armed with a camera and a revolver of heavy calibre, and thoroughly versed in the law covering her powers and duties, Mrs. Powers has gone fearlessly about her work and in the past year has made 16 arrests, killed 41 horses and caused numerous prosecutions. Using her camera to secure indisputable evidence she notifies wrong-doers of the law and their duty in the case. Miss Kendall has confined most of her activities to Nashua and its immediate vicinity, where she has caused many arrests to be made for cruelty to children and animals.

"I often find it necessary to make arrests," said Mrs. Powers, "and have locked up many offenders, including a number of men. I have a team driver and thus far have not met with any resistance when arresting a person.

"Keene is a center for cattle traffic in New Hampshire and I am requested to inspect all cattle cars to see that the law against cruelty is being observed.

"I have no fear and thus far nothing has occurred to discourage me in this work."

Both deputies are enthusiastic in their work so far.
