GOULD'S TEMPER

Wife's Temper a Source of Constant Annoyance.

IS EXTREMELY EXTRAVAGANT

Mrs. Gould's Display of Jewels in Public Annoyed Her Husband While Her Temper Embarrassed Him and Was a Bar to Their Domestic Happiness.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Two of the

counter charges in Howard Gould's reply to his wife's divorce suit for separation have been announced, on the authority, it is stated, of Mr. Gould. One is that she was extremely extravagant. The other is that Mrs. Gould's temper was a source of constant annoyance to Mr. Gould and many times placed him in embarrassing positions with his friends, besides being a barrier to their domestic happiness.

Mr. Gould also said that his wife's display of jewels in public places, was a source of annoyance to him. In his reply Mr. Gould will tell of suits brought against his wife by tradesmen. Some of these were for dresses and others for jewels. He will say that his wife was reckless in her expenditures and cite these suits as proof.

Mrs. Gould's defence to the various suits was always that she had been imposed upon by the tradesmen and the prices charged her were too high.

CONFINE POLITICAL WORK.

Officeholders Work Within Party and Escape President's Rebuke.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—As long as federal officeholders confine their political activities to work within their own party they are not likely, apparently, at least, to be subject to a rebuke from the President. A distinction appears to be drawn between ante and post convention work on the part of officeholders. The proposition appears to be simple. In taking part in the preliminaries leading to the selection of delegates to the State and National conventions, officeholders are merely exercising their rights in their own party. But should they, being servants of the whole people, employ their office to further the election of a choice of only a part of the people, then they become guilty of pernicious activity. Secretary of the Interior Garfield, who like Mr. Roosevelt, was formerly a member of the Civil Service Commission, said that was possible the President might call attention to this feature of the civil service regulations before the election. Inferentially he is not likely to do so before the convention.


OAKLAND MURDER.
