## WHY THE FISH DON'T RUN BETTER

### SECRETARY ROSENBERG OF THE UNITED FISHERMEN GIVES AN ENTIRELY DIFFERENT EXPLANATION TO MR. SEABORG.

Secretary Rosenberg, of the United Fishermen of the Pacific, when seen yesterday, said:

"That story in today's Astorian by Veteran Canneryman Seaborg, has all of the earmarks of a fish yarn. Mr. Seaborg knows a good deal about fishing on the Columbia; he certainly knows that his statement that the gill nets concentrate at the mouth of the Columbia and that they fish without breach and cessation, so that the fish actually never have a chance to ascend, is hum-combe pure and simple.

"Mr. Seaborg, in making this statement, either felt in the fish-yarn telling mood, or made that statement for some specific purpose, that purpose certainly not being intended to aid in the saving of our salmon industry by the adoption of measures that would go to the root of the evil.

"But without further question of Mr. Seaborg's motives, let us examine into the actual facts. Let us see how fishing is conducted at the entrance of the river and further up. Then any fair-minded, intelligent man, whether fisherman or landsman, will be able to judge for himself.

"The gillnets that fish at the entrance of the river, say from the Great Republic and further out, average in the day time three hours of fishing and in the night time less than that, the danger at night being increased. Thus even giving three hours at night, gill nets there fish only 6 hours out of every 24. This limitation of fishing hours is caused by the strength of the tide. With a strong ebb tide, no one but a crazy man would drift out to sea. With a strong flood tide, while some nets drift to the anchoring point, they hardly ever catch in such drifts any fish. Everyone familiar with the working of a gill net knows that near slack tide the net hangs perpendicular, when the best fishing as a rule is done, but as soon as the ebb or flood commences to really run, the lead-line is lifted and the net drifts slantwise, with hardly any or very poor chances of catching any fish. Thus at the entrance of the river the salmon are not molested by gill nets for 18 hours out of 24. Further in the latter part of the season when the water is clear, gill-netting is only carried on at night, as no salmon gill when they can see the net. In the river above the Great Republic, gill nets often fish more than 6 hours out of 24, when they have a chance to drift over flats and sand bars. But Seaborg's complaint is that the salmon are kept out of the river by gill nets at the entrance. His fish yarn is here exploded.

"Now what is the real reason for the scarcity of salmon? Official reports and common observation easily show it. There have been of late years very few fish for our hatcheries and natural spawning grounds. If a farmer kills all of his pigs one year, he can't have little pigs next year, is plain enough. In every salmon river in Oregon and Washington every possible device was

tried to check the decrease of salmon. There were shortened seasons, there were Sunday closing laws, there were hatcheries. But not until fishing was stopped in the narrow upper part of the rivers was the downward tendency stopped, so that now, except on the Columbia, no fishing for salmon is allowed in these two states in any river above tide water, that is above the point where the tide ceases to affect the level of the river. In the Sacramento, the second largest salmon coast stream, no stationary gear of any kind is allowed. And in all of these rivers the salmon output of late has steadily increased, with no increase of fishing appliances to speak of.

"Within the last four or five years the fishwheels in the Columbia have been so improved and extended, that fish reaching them, from a six-inch salmon to a 50-pound salmon, are practically all caught and our hatcheries in the upper Columbia are idle. On the Columbia only, are fishwheels permitted. There are none in Alaska, in British Columbia or any coast stream.

"The catch of salmon on the Columbia River in 1905 was 34,000,000 pounds. Averaging each salmon at 20 pounds, it took 1,700,000 salmon to make up the catch. The wheelmen in the upper river claim that they only get 5 per cent of the total catch. Well, that would have been 85,000 salmon as their share. Counting half of these salmon as females, that would be 42,500 females. As it is estimated that each female salmon on an average has 400 eggs, that would give 17,000,000 eggs for our hatcheries and natural spawning grounds, sufficient to preserve our hatcheries, especially if such closing of the Columbia at tide water would also be supplemental by regulation of the size of meshes of the fish traps and seines. I think I can safely state that the gill net fishermen, should the wheels be abolished, would readily support a Sunday closing law and other measures tending toward real protection of the salmon. That has been the record and the practice of the gill netters of every coast stream.

"The gill netters hope to be able within the next year to convince the voters of Oregon that no belief in fish yarns and action based upon them, but well-tried common sense measures only can save our salmon fisheries, namely that the fishing must be stopped in the narrow upper river, where practically every fish during the entire 24 hours of the entire season can be scooped up by the ever turning fishwheels."

### SLAYS THE GERMS

#### New Method of Sterilization by Electrocutation.

#### KILLS ALL ORDINARY GERMS

Dr. Karl H. Von Klein is the inventor of the New Method Whereby Germs Are Electrocutated by Means of Positive and Negative Wires.

CHICAGO, June 11.—The bacillus will meet death by electrocution should a new method of sterilization proclaimed yesterday by Dr. Karl H. Von Klein, come into general practice.

Two wires charged with positive and negative currents and a metallic bowl, preferably copper, are the weapons with which Dr. von Klein slays the germs. With one of the wires applied to the outside of the vessel, the other resting in the fluid, it contains, he claims swift and sure death by electrocution is meted out to the unwelcome life therein.

"Sterilization by my method," said Dr. von Klein, "not only kills all the ordinary germs and bacilli, but it likewise kills the fermentive germs and itself becomes a most wonderful preservative. I tried it on a bowl of milk last Thursday. Here it is Monday and that milk is as sweet and pure as possible." Having satisfied himself of the effects of electricity on milk and water, Dr. von Klein proposes trying it on fruits and vegetables. He also hopes to evolve a plan by which a copper mesh could be inserted in the chief water mains and then by means of his positive and negative electric currents, sterilize every drop of water that passes through.
