WATERFRONT ITEMS

Three Locally Known Vessels Disabled.

HONG KONG AS FLOUR CENTER

Steam Schooner Yosemite Goes On the Rocks Near Humes Mill Over the Same Spot As the Old Silvia de Grasse Wreck—Other Notes of Local Interest.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—The five-masted schooner Louis which went ashore at Franconia Beach on the West side of the Farallone Islands yesterday morning during a dense fog broke up at 2 o'clock this morning. The vessel and her cargo of lumber will be a total loss.

More wheat and less flour will be sent from the Pacific Coast to the Orient next year, say officers of the steamship Arabia who think the new Rennis mill at Hong Kong will supply much of the home trade. For a time they say it will grind American wheat. Later the owner will try to get his grain from Manchuria.

On the way to the Columbia the Arabia took 250 barrels of flour from the new mill to Kobe, Japan. Larger orders will soon be filled, it is declared, and trade from this coast reduced proportionately.

Many United States warships were sighted by the Arabia in Far Eastern waters. The West Virginia and two other four-funneled cruisers, whose names are not learned were seen at Kobe. At Yokohama there were two battleships flying the stars and stripes. The Arabia's officers presumed the craft were simply on their regular cruise.

People who have been at Seaside recently say the coasters are running closer to the shore this season than formerly making it possible for men on shore almost to recognize passengers on deck.

The warships bound for the Columbia also steamed close to the shore and proved a welcome spectacle to the people at the beach. On the same day the steamers Costa Rica, Vosburg, Dauntless and Alliance passed by, and were in hailing distance. They were so close that they could easily be recognized. When the weather is foggy, or thick from other cause, however, it is said the coasters stand farther off shore.

The steamer Yosemite arrived up the river about 9 o'clock Wednesday night from San Francisco. The vessel ran up the river making for Humes' Mill without a pilot, and the consequence was she ran aground on a reef and right on top of the wreck of the old French ship the Silvia de Grasse. What cargo the vessel had was being lightened from her yesterday, but she remained hard and fast all day. Captain Larkins of the Lurline said that she appeared to have a considerable hump in her as though she were badly filled. It is hoped however that she would come off without much damage at high tide last night.

The steamer Melville Dollar crossed the bar at 2:20 yesterday. She tied up at the foot of Eighth street and discharged water ballast while waiting for her pilot. The Melville Dollar came up from Frisco and called in at Tillamook on the way. There she took on a portion of a lumber cargo. This is her first voyage up the Columbia. She came from the Orient to San Francisco and had a splendid passage across. The Melville Dollar will proceed to Stella to load lumber.

The British steamship Tottenham, Captain Mann, which sailed from the Columbia, May 25, with a cargo of lumber shipped by the Pacific Export Company, arrived at Kobe, Japan, yesterday morning. She reports that she is badly disabled, having struck a rock off the Japanese coast. She is leaking badly and 14 of her plates are broken in. She will go in drydock for repairs at Kobe.

The steamship Costa Rica came down yesterday and proceeded to sea on her voyage to San Francisco. She had a big load of freight and a number of passengers.
