SECURING EASTERN LOGGERS

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DOES GOOD WORK FOR MILL MEN OF THIS DISTRICT AND MAY SETTLE DEARTH OF GOOD MEN IN CAMP.

From letters received by the Astoria Chamber of Commerce it would appear that this energetic body has solved the question of a shortage of labor in the logging and lumber camps of the west. From an advertisement placed in eastern newspapers very recently, answers are being received from men who have worked for years in eastern camps, who are anxious to come west.

With the exception of eastern labor bureaus, which go more after the dollar than in an effort to please those who apply for positions, there has been no systematic attempt to secure eastern labor for the logging business in the west. The following sample of letters received by Secretary White, yesterday, indicate that plenty of good labor can be secured:

HOULTON, Maine.

"Gentlemen—I would like to know your terms for woodsmen. I weigh 160 pounds. Send me your terms and I can come as soon as I hear from you. Do you advance money for the ticket? I have followed the woods six years and am familiar with all branches of the woods work.

Letters of this description sound like business and the writer would probably make a valuable acquisition to a logging camp company compared to the vagrant style of logger. With the opening of the logging camps this feature of the work of the Chamber of Commerce will prove of great assistance to mill men.

SEND JAPANESE HOME.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 8.—The largest number of Japanese ever deported from this coast will leave on the steamer Manchuria for the Orient today. The deportations number 106 and are Japanese caught stealing over the Mexican border into Texas. They were brought here by the inspector in charge of the immigration bureau at Fort Worth.

The Japanese were marched on board the steamer Manchuria yesterday under guard and will be closely watched to prevent their escape.

BREWERY EXPLOSION.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 8.—A large brewery here has been consumed by fire with considerable loss of life. Carbonic acid pipes exploded killing and wounding forty persons among them being firemen, policemen and spectators.

A PLEASANT BIRTHDAY.

Judge Anderson Treated to a Birthday Surprise Party—Many Presents.

Last night our worthy city auditor and police judge received the surprise of his life. About 40 of his friends took his home by storm and reminded him that it was his birthday. With the connivance of Mrs. Anderson the surprise was made complete and it was some little while before the judge recovered himself. After a pleasant season of congratulations and felicitations all assembled and sat down to an elegant repast prepared secretly by the invaders. Several beautiful and costly presents were made to the happy recipient and he will surely remember this birthday. Before the party dispersed many remembered that the judge had sentenced several of our worthy and unworthy citizens and that it would be but justice to give him a dose of his own medicine. Accordingly, he was placed on trial and after a thorough investigation into his present and past actions he was found guilty by a jury of his friends. It having been figured up that the total length of time to which he had sentenced others, figuring out the imprisonment at a rate of \$2 per day, was 49 years 7 months and 16 days, he was sentenced to live for 50 additional years and it was recommended that he receive no credit marks that would cut short the time of his sentence. Judge Anderson is about on his own recognizance.
