#### KILLS HIS WIFE.

**Wild With Jealousy A. J. McKenzie Then Blows Out His Own Brains.**

SEATTLE, August 13.—Enraged by wild jealousy of his wife and by her indifference to him, Alexander J. McKenzie rushed into his former home at 919 Jackson street, at 10:30 this morning, and after felling his 18-year-old daughter, Alma, with the butt of his revolver, sent a bullet through the brain of his wife. After firing twice more at the dead body, he took the muzzle of the weapon in his mouth and blew out his brains.

McKenzie and his wife have been married for 20 years. Four months ago the wife entered suit for divorce in the local courts. It is supposed that McKenzie has been brooding over this ever since, and that the culmination has been the murder and suicide. McKenzie did not attempt to shoot his daughter. The girl tried to protect her mother and grappled with him. It was then that he struck her over the head with the revolver. The blow rendered her unconscious and she did not see the tragedy.

#### STOP TAX GRAFT.

CHEHALIS, Wash., August 13.—The Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, the Continental and other large holders, as well as all the smaller timber owners who have timber holdings in Lewis county on which the county's cruisers have made report will receive notice within the next two or three days to appear before the Lewis county equalization board and show cause why their valuations on timber land holdings should not be raised. Some of the raises are 50, some 100 and some 200 per cent. It has been found that certain sections which have heretofore been turned in at ridiculously low valuations are worth vastly more than they have been represented to be worth and it is charged against the Weyerhaeuser Company that one section which their agents have represented as burned over and practically worthless has on it more than 60,000,000 feet of fine timber. The board and Cruiser Clinton are at Seattle and Tacoma consulting with the authorities there in regard to the cruisers in King and Pierce counties.

#### COAL SUPPLY WARNING.

WASHINGTON, August 13.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today made public certain correspondence with railroad and state officers as a warning to people in the Northwest that unless they lay in supplies of coal this summer they may again experience a fuel famine next winter. Last winter thousands of persons in the Northwest suffered keenly owing to the coal famine.

The federal government, state authorities and railroad officers are active in an effort to have fuel supplies put in now in order that the famine of last winter may not recur. In a letter to the commission Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific Railroad, said: "If there should happen to be another long cold winter in the Northwest, such as the last one there may be trouble again about the providing of adequate fuel supplies unless consumers will buy ahead of time. Our company had added very largely to its equipment in the last 12 months, but the country is growing, so that more and more fuel is needed, and I doubt if it can all be handled after the cold weather sets in."

The federal government intends to see to it that all its departments in Western states are fully supplied with fuel before autumn. Orders to this effect have been issued by the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Interior.

## ALL TAKEN BACK

### Boilermakers on S. P. End Their Strike Yesterday.

### FOREMAN CARTER RESIGNS

Strike Was Over His Removal by the Company and He Solves Question by Resigning—Strike Threatened All the Boilermakers on the Coast.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13.—The boilermakers' strike ended today. All the men were taken back except one. This man was a helper who did not walk out with the rest. He has been transferred to another department. The settlement followed the resignation of Foreman Carter, the demand for whose removal caused the strike.

#### HARRIMAN WILL CONTROL.

NEW YORK August 13.—Peace and harmony instead of predicted discord and bickering, prevailed yesterday at the annual meeting of the shareholders of Wells-Fargo & Company. No opposition to the Harriman control, like that which developed at last year's meeting, was revealed yesterday and all the retiring directors were re-elected. The question of distributing the assets of the company was not discussed. The board of directors will hold a meeting for organization within a few days.

The peaceful character of yesterday's annual meeting was in marked contrast with that of last year, when the minority shareholders attacked the Harriman management in an effort to wrest from it the control of the company. On that occasion William Nelson Cromwell made the famous remark that E. H. Harriman "moved in a higher world" of finance, into which ordinary shareholders should not dare to introduce themselves. The Harriman management however, was victorious in the encounter and has fortified itself further in its position since then.

It was believed until the meeting yesterday that the directors were considering a plan for the distribution of a portion of the company's accumulated surplus, either in the form of an additional dividend or in new securities. The opposition which appeared at last year's meeting was the outgrowth of dissatisfaction over the company's dividend policy. The directors partly modified the insurrectionists before the annual meeting by increasing the disbursement from 8 to 10 per cent.

Both the American and Adams Express companies have increased their disbursements to shareholders within the last year, the latter by a 200 per cent security distribution in the form of collateral trust bonds.

#### BATTERY IN CAMP.

Field Artillery, Oregon National Guard, is Making a Fine Record.

SEASIDE, Or., August 13.—The First Battery, Field Artillery, of the Oregon National Guard, in camp here is the only state organization similarly equipped this side of the Rocky Mountains, and the way it has handled the guns on this, its first trial, is remarkable.

The four field pieces are the latest model of the United States regulation. The charge is shrapnel, a 15-pound explosive projectile. When the shrapnel explodes it turns loose 200 bullets, each 48 of an inch in diameter. When the explosion is to take place is determined by the range-finding party by means of a Weldon range-finder. The command is given by the captain, after the report of the range-finder is in, to the gunners, who adjust the guns at the proper angles and the shrapnel for the proper place of explosion.

An ideal shot is to explode the shrapnel 50 yards over and 50 yards in front of a given object. This will kill every living object in several hundred square feet.

In target practice here against Tillamook Head this shot has been placed almost perfectly and other shots have been made first to pierce a given target and then explode.

The battery practices on the beach every morning, and a large crowd of spectators is always on hand to cheer the good shots.

#### THREATENED WITH REVOLVER.

PORTLAND, August 13.—M. I. Degnen, a bartender, was taken into custody on Washington street last night by Sergeant Cole on complaint of Leona Bowen of Vancouver, Wash., who claimed that the fellow threatened her life. Degnen was locked up in the city prison in default of bail and the young woman swore to a complaint against him charging disorderly conduct.

About a month ago, Degnen is said to have raised a disturbance in the Harrison court apartments, Fifth and Harrison street, by attempting to effect an entrance to the rooms of Mrs. Hamilton where Miss Bowen was residing. Last Saturday the complainant alleges that he came to her home in Vancouver armed with a revolver and threatened to slay her. Upon arriving here yesterday she avers that Degnen persisted in accompanying her about town and when she started to board a car threatened to do her harm if she left him.

The woman, who is a handsome blonde and resides with her mother in Vancouver, declares that Degnen has continually annoyed her with his attentions and she fears for her life if he is at liberty. She attributes his unseemly conduct to over-indulgence in absinthe. The case has been continued until tomorrow for hearing.

#### PHILIPPINE REUNION.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., August 13.—Kansas City extended a hearty welcome today to the Army of the Philippines, whose annual national encampment will be in session during the remainder of this week. The society has a membership of 120,000, representing those regiments that served in the Philippines during the Spanish-American war. The attendance at the encampment is large, the far west being particularly well represented. Lieutenant General Arthur MacArthur, U. S. A., commander-in-chief of the society, is here, and will review the big military parade tomorrow. A number of other military men of prominence are also here to take part in the proceedings. Minneapolis will invite the society to hold its gathering year in that city.
