WATERFRONT ITEMS

St. Louis Arrives in From New-castle With Coal Cargo.

MAKES QUICK TRIP TO PORT

Lakme Crosses in and Takes on Fuel Oil Before Proceeding up the River—Has on Large Cargo of California Red-wood From Eureka.

Beginning with today, as the fishing season is over, Water Baliff Settem and Deputy Fish Commissioner Frank Brown will be busy on the fish Patrol boat along the river, investigating for illegal fishing. This boat will confine its operations to the entire territory of the Columbia where the officers think that there is apt to be illegal fishing. During the closed season, from August 25 to September 10 the boat will be very busy and will work secretly protecting the fish which are now working their way up the river to spawn.

The Maverick, oil steamer from San Francisco, arrived in yesterday and went on up the river.

The St. Nicholas is still lying in mid-stream and will not move to her dock for discharging cargo for a few days yet.

The Columbia River bar pilot schooner Joseph Pulitzer arrived in yesterday after being out about six weeks. Captain Suttum, senior pilot aboard, brought the schooner in. The crew were paid off and the Pulitzer will probably remain inside for two or three days before returning to her post.

The Alvena, four-masted schooner, was taken up the river yesterday to Port-land for a load of lumber.

There is going to be six different tug-o-war teams take part in the Regatta but there is one novel one which is worth mentioning. Two dogs down on the dock can make more fun at a tug-o-war than any number of husky men pulling on a rope. Sheriff Pomeroy has a little black dog named "Snap" and Agent Blessing, of the Vancouver Transportation Co., has a little terrier named "Snap" and with a rope knotted at each end and about two feet long they will provide any amount of fun. They like to tug each other around and if they were put on a barge right below the Regatta grandstand where everybody could see their antics it would be one of the best cards on the waterfront program.

The steam schooner Lakme, Captain Prebble, arrived in yesterday from Eureka with a load of 300,000 feet of red wood which is consigned to Nicolai-Neppach Company, of Portland. While in port she stopped at the oil tank for a supply of oil.

Captain Prebble stated yesterday that he experienced a hard trip on the way up as the weather was very thick and the ocean rough and choppy. In addition to this he had to make against a strong head wind all the way. The sun was obscured all the trip but notwithstanding the many difficulties he made a quick trip to the mouth of the river.

In speaking of the orders requiring all vessels to be fumigated and inspected which were yesterday issued by the quarantine service Captain Prebble said: "I think it is one of the best things that could be done and such proceedings will certainly cope with any disease germs which may be in the ship and especially the bubonic plague germs if it is true that they are carried by rats. There are many rats in all ships and it is a good thing for them all to be killed."

"And if the quarantine service was only smart it would do a good thing if it would order all the men to take a bath and clean themselves up. That would prevent a good many diseases also. The sailors, many of them, go around in too dirty a condition. Why, I remember a ship I was on last year had such an experience. The men all took a notion one day and cleaned up and the truth of the matter is I couldn't tell who they were—they looked like strangers, so clean were they."

Although Captain Prebble's ideas concerning cleanliness might be construed to arise from the condition of his ship yet this is not the case. The Lakme is one of the neatest, though rather aged, schooners on the coast trade.

The steamer Northland, Captain Sorenson, arrived down yesterday and passed out bound for San Francisco with a cargo of lumber.

The Costa Rica, Captain Mason, arrived in yesterday and after discharging some of her cargo at the O. R. & N. dock proceeded to Portland. She has a full passenger list.

The St. Louis arrived in yesterday being out 71 days from Newcastle, Australia. She experienced the usual variable weather that has been found on this course all season but made a quick trip notwithstanding. She has a cargo

of coal consigned to Portland, Hind. Rolph Co.

The broken part of the tug Wallula's machinery was received yesterday from Portland and adjusted to the machinery. The boat is back in commission again after being tied up at her dock for the past week.

STOLE FOR HIS FAMILY IS BELIEF.

16 Year Old Youth Arrested On Petty Larceny Charge.

BROOKLYN, Aug. 24.—Thomas Currie a forlorn and rather tattered 16-year-old youth, very small for his age, who said he lived at 137 Jefferson avenue, was arrested this morning by Sergeant McGarry on a charge of petty larceny made by Carl Knopf, of 126 Atlantic Avenue.

Knopf, who is the manager of a factory for the making of auto speed indicators, has been missing small articles from the factory since last Christmas. The thefts became so numerous at one time that he had to lay off several men or close the factory. He suspected that some one in the factory was taking things but he could not imagine who.

Knopf today missed a gold watch movement which was to be used to make an indicator. His suspicions were fastened on Currie. He took Currie into a private office and searched him and alleges that he found the missing article in the boy's clothing. He then handed him over to Sergeant McGarry.

In court the boy said he lived in a furnished room at 137 Jefferson avenue with his brother, Hugh, the place being owned by a family named Ericson. His brother, he said, does not work and the police think the little fellow is supporting him. The boy said that he had no friends, that his mother was dead and that he did not know where his father was.

Magistrate Hylan held him in \$200 bail until August 28 for a hearing.

NOT TRUE TO PROMISE.

Soldier Is Courtmartialled And Sentenced To Military Penitentiary.

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 24.—For breaking his promise to marry and defrauding a girl of her money, Private James M. Payne, Sixteenth artillery, at Fort Leavenworth, was tried by a courtmartial and sentenced to three years in the military penitentiary.

The girl is an army nurse, whose name the authorities refuse to divulge. Payne became engaged to the girl, who lives away from here, and alleged that he had passed an examination for promotion to an officer, and he borrowed money from her to fit out in uniform. He borrowed a second time, and shortly before the date set for the marriage, said he would lose a fortune left by his father if he married within five years.

The courtmartial found that Payne's conduct was a disgrace to the uniform and to the prejudice of good order and military discipline. General Godfrey approved the sentence.

READY TO WELCOME PRINCE.

Will Arrive At Hampton Roads Tomorrow on Cruiser Fylgia.

NORFOLK, Va., August 24.—Right royal will be the welcome to Prince Wilhelm, of Sweden, when the cruiser Fylgia arrives at Hampton Roads tomorrow for a visit of several days at the Jamestown Exposition. The Fylgia is one of the newest and most handsome ships of the Swedish navy. She is due in the Roads tomorrow evening. Her arrival will be welcomed by a salute from the ships of the North Atlantic squadron, now here.

Baron Lagerantz, the Swedish Minister, accompanied by the secretary of the Swedish Legation, will open quarters at the Hotel Chamberlain at Old Point Comfort tomorrow morning in anticipation of the arrival of His Royal Highness, Charles W. Kohlsatt, the foreign commissioner of the exposition, will assist in the arrangements for the entertainment of the distinguished visitor.

A dinner will be given by Minister Lagerantz at the Hotel Chamberlain in honor of Prince Wilhelm, which will be invited officers of the United States navy and of the exposition company.

A banquet will be given the following evening to the Prince by Vice-Consul Fernstrom at the Virginia Club in this city. A special steamer will bring the Prince and other guests from the Fylgia to Norfolk. The officers of the United States Navy here, as well as President Tucker, of the exposition company, will also entertain the Prince.

It is expected that the welcome to the Prince will be participated in by many Swedish-Americans from various parts of the country, particularly the West and Northwest. Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, who is of Swedish parentage, has been sent a special invitation to attend all the social functions to be given in honor of Prince Wilhelm.
