

HATCHING STATION ON ALSEA RIVER

WILL BE LOCATED AT MOUTH OF ROCK CREEK—OREGON ANGLERS' ASSOCIATION TO HOLD IMPORTANT MEETING AT GOLD HILL.

Master Fish Warden H. B. Van Dusen has returned from an inspection tour of the Southern Oregon and coast hatcheries and reports that the stations are all getting well ready for the season. The season on the coast hatcheries will open about September 1.

The principal object of his visit was to select a site for the Alsea hatchery. He was successful in this and at the mouth of the Rock Creek on the Alsea River, 11 miles above tide water he has made the selection and a station capable of handling 5,000,000 eggs will be built. The work by this time has already started and will be pushed with vigor. Several men will be employed in building troughs and erecting buildings for the season's efforts in taking fish and others will be employed in constructing racks in the stream and in building the necessary live pens for the fish to be spawned.

Mr. Van Dusen also visited the Yaquina Bay hatchery and reports that everything at that point is progressing along well with the season.

The Gold Hill Chamber of Commerce is to hold a meeting of the Oregon Anglers' Association on September 14 and Mr. Van Dusen has been asked to attend and give a talk on the hatchery work. This is the first meeting of the association and its purpose is to form such an organization that proper fish laws can be obtained from the legislature for protecting the game fish of the Oregon streams. In addition to the business of the meeting there will be the sport feature. There will be fly casting contests and as there are a number of good fishing streams in the neighborhood of Gold Hill it is likely that a number of the sportsmen will take advantage of that fact and do a little trout fishing.

The object in holding the meeting is to conserve the game fish of the streams of the state such as the McKenzie, Umpqua, Rogue, Colquille, Clackamas, and other streams. These streams are known all over the country as being fine fishing streams and sportsmen spend a great deal of money in coming to Oregon to take advantage of the sport. Unless there is some legislation and a united support of the fishing laws these streams and their trout will soon be a thing of the past. The idea is to make the streams a source of pleasure and at the same time income for the state. People

coming from afar to fish will spend their money at some point of the state and in that way contribute to the resources of the state. It is a state interest and the Anglers' Association will be the official head of it.

DAIRY PRICES WILL INCREASE

BECAUSE OF SCARCITY OF MILK AND HIGH PRICE OF BUTTER THE DAIRYMEN FORM AGREEMENT TO RAISE PRICES, SEPTEMBER 1.

The dairymen of Astoria met together yesterday morning and by mutual agreement will raise the price of milk commencing September 1. The high price of butter and the growing scarcity of milk decided them to make the advance. The following schedule of prices has been arranged to take effect on the first of the month:

Milk, wholesale, 60 cents per can.
Cream, wholesale, \$1.20 per gallon.
Milk, retail, \$1.50 pint, monthly.
Milk, retail, \$2.50 quart, monthly.
Milk, retail, \$3.50 3 pints, monthly.
Milk, retail, \$4.50 2 quarts, monthly.
Milk, retail, \$5.50 5 pints, monthly.
Milk, retail, \$6.50 3 quarts, monthly.
Milk, retail, \$8.50 gallon, monthly.
Cream, retail, \$2.75 1 pint, monthly.
Cream, per month, 1 pint, \$5.50

The dairymen have made the above raise in prices, to take effect on September 1, because of the dearth of milk and the raise in the price of butter, the concerns in the agreement being: The Acme Dairy, Sunflower Dairy, Bartoldus Brothers, Henningsen & Son, Lewis & Clark Dairy, Carl Sarajarvi, John Erickson and G. G. Nurnberg.

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
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
