INDIAN WILL ENTERTAIN
Muskogee, I. T., August 25.—A. C. Trumble, Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress, has appointed Chief Pleasant Porter host for all the Indians who may attend the Congress in November, both of the five Civilized Tribes and of the Osage Nation. Chief Porter is one of the picturesque characters of the Southwest. He is the last Chief of the Creek Nation, and has always been regarded as one of the leading counselors of his tribe in everything which pertains to progress. General Porter will entertain the distinguished visitors to the Congress with the same lavish hand which has marked his career in the Indian Territory. He will not only be chairman of the committee on Indian entertainment, but he will serve on several other committees as well.

WOULD TAKE CHAIR

Harry Day, Mine Owner, Would be Governor of Idaho.

DOES NOT DENY HE WILL RUN

Has Been Very Active in Idaho Politics For Many Years And Is Said To Have No Enemies—His Friends Want Him To Be The Next Democratic Governor.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 26.—Harry Day, Idaho millionaire, one of the owners of the Hercules mine and a member of the democratic state central committee, may become a candidate for governor. This intimation was dropped last night by several members of the state central committee who had a "chance" meeting at the Spokane hotel. None of them would be quoted in the matter, but all admitted that Mr. Day is being urged to make the race, and expressed the belief that he will be a strong candidate.

Mr. Day denied that he is to be a candidate, but did not say that he would not enter the race later. "I am having enough fun out of the political game as a committeeman," he said. "Show me that I can be reelected for three terms and then sent to the senate, and I will accept," he added facetiously.

There were six members of the state central committee at the so-called "chance" meeting last night. Secretary C. E. Armen, who is also a member of the executive committee of the state committee, had "been up north and just happened to be in the city." Ramsey M. Walker of Kendrick, chairman of the committee had been on a hunting trip to Davenport, Wash., and by the merest chance stopped in Spokane on his return trip. Dan Greenberg of Lewiston had come up "on business" not knowing the other committeemen were to be in town. Harry Day was making his bi-monthly business trip to the city, Judge Edwin McEee of Rathdrum and S. P. Donnelly of Lakeview spend much of their time in Spokane, and "just happened" to be here yesterday when the other committeemen appeared. There was nothing "significant" about the meeting, said the committee in chorus; Mr. Day has our indorsement for the governorship, said they all individually in the corner.

Harry Day has been active in Idaho politics for several years. He is not a campaigner, but has done important work as a committeeman, and is said to have a strong following in northern Idaho.

"He has no enemies," said one of the committeemen last night. "He will be strong with the labor voters, although he is a mineowner, and he will be popular with the business interests. He has never antagonized any class and few individuals."

The entrance of Mr. Day into the race will put a new phase on the political situation. Former United States Senator Henry Heitfeld of Lewiston has been considered the "logical" candidate, although he had not announced that he will enter the race. How the democratic forces throughout the state, particularly in the southern part, will line up is a matter about which the committee is speculating. In addition to being a mineowner Harry Day is owner of the Wallace Times, is a stockholder in the Fidelity National bank of Spokane and president of the Day-Luellwitz Lumber company at Spokane.

PASTOR'S DAUGHTER VICTIM.

Fourteen-Year-Old Abducted And Bound To Tree At Turnersville.

GREENVILLE, PA., Aug. 26.—It is reported that a tramp who assaulted Anna Whitehead, the 14-year-old daughter of Rev. J. M. Whitehead, a Methodist clergyman, in the woods near Turnersville, has been caught by a posse near Wickliffe, Ohio, and lynched.

The girl was forcibly abducted from the streets of Turnersville and bound to a tree, to be released only when the Sabbath dawned. The girl was repeatedly assaulted.

The pursuit started when the little girl, exhausted and bruised, staggered into her parents' home this morning and told of the tramp's seizing her in the street when she had been sent to a neighbor's on an errand at 7 o'clock Saturday evening, of his thrusting a bag over her head and then carrying her to the woods.

The man, who had fled, leaving her all but unconscious on the ground and with his threat of death if she told of his treatment of her, was seen on the Lake Shore track, and the posse, swelled now to hundreds and led by Chief of Police Flower of this city and Sheriff Williams of Meadville, Pa., and guided by bloodhounds, rapidly narrowed the search to a swamp on the Ben Jones farm, near Wickliffe, Ohio 28 miles from here.

The dogs followed the scent to the swamp, but could not pick it up later, and the farmers, posting sentinels about the swamp, with orders to shoot on sight, plunged into the shrub-covered low ground intent on taking a life for the fiendish attack on the little girl.

INVESTIGATING CONCRETE FAILURES.

Government Takes Matter in Hand and Looks For Information.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Through the Geological Survey, the United States Government is making a thorough investigation into the collapses of reinforced concrete buildings. Richard L. Humphrey, expert in charge of the U. S. Geological Survey's Structural Material Laboratories in St. Louis and Norfolk, has directed the examination of concrete buildings which have lately collapsed. Tests have been made primarily for the Government, but the results will be published for the benefit of builders in general. "The danger of careless concrete construction," says Mr. Humphrey, "confronts nearly every city of the country and it is a miracle to me that more concrete buildings have not collapsed. In order to meet this problem squarely every city in the United States should revise its building laws in such a manner that either owner or contractor of a concrete building shall be compelled to employ a competent inspector to follow every detail of construction.

Great loss of life and property through collapses of concrete buildings in the last year or two, inspired the Government to make an investigation of the causes. By spreading correct information as to the risks involved in concrete construction the experts hope to avert further calamities. This is in line with the campaign of education already begun by the International Society of State and Municipal Building Commissioners.

Mr. Humphrey has examined carefully nearly every one of the buildings that have collapsed in the last year. He found evidences not only of carelessness but of ignorance. "The science of concrete construction is not yet thoroughly settled and until it is the greatest care should be taken in the use of materials," he says.
