HIS ODD AD.

The Collar That Gave Plumley a Second Start in Business. "Nothing succeeds like perseverance," said Mark Twain at a dinner. "When the luck seems most against us, then we should work and hope hardest of all. In moments of discouragement let us remember my old friend Henry Plumley of Virginia City. "Henry Plumley ran a collar factory. Times were reported to be hard with him. When his factory, which was very heavily insured, burned down, there was every indication that he had set the place on fire himself in order to get the insurance money. Virginia City was the soul of honor in those days. Shocked beyond words, it rose en masse, seized Henry Plumley, put a halter round his neck and lynched him. "But he did not die. The sheriff arrived and cut him down in time. He was tried and found guilty, and he served a term in jail. "On his release you wouldn't have thought that he'd return to Virginia City again, eh? He did, though. He came back, reopened his collar factory and prospered. "What gave him his start was the old advertisement with which he announced his return to business among us. Preceded by a brass band, Henry, in a great gilt chariot, burst upon our streets. He sat on a kind of golden throne, and he held on a crimson cushion in his lap an old, old collar. Above the collar on a crimson banner waved this inscription in huge letters of gold: "This is the collar we wore when we were lynched. It saved our life. Be wise in time and use no other. At all retailers, 10 cents apiece, three for a quarter."—Indianapolis Star. Old Glory Humiliated. One instance is known in which Old Glory's shame is the crown of a family's prestige. At the battle of Bladensburg the American troops were defeated by the British under the command of an Irish officer named Ross. In recognition of his services in winning this victory his sovereign granted him the title of Ross of Bladensburg, and to his crest was added an American flag, reversed, with the shaft broken. The title is hereditary. In our generation the possessor is a colonel of the Irish fusiliers. And this Ross of Bladensburg uses as his crest today our stars and stripes turned upside down and with the shaft broken in two.—Chicago Record-Herald.

SHAW HAS ILLUSION

This Time it is Over Ellen Terry.

CALLS HER A NEW WOMAN

Weaves a Halo of Adoration Around Famous Actress Who Has Now Grown Old But Still Capable of Acting Quaint Character as no Other Actress Can.

Bernard Shaw has at least one illusion. There is no doubt about it. And this illusion takes the form of Ellen Terry. One may search in vain throughout his two volumes of dramatic opinions for a single unastigmatic criticism of her acting. Moreover, this youthful enthusiasm of the "G. B. S." embraces not only Miss Terry, but all her relations—Kate, Marion, Mabel. At last we have found one weak spot in the Shawian armor—and it is not in his heel. There are really few things so delightfully sentimental and romantic in the present-day drama as the idealization of the "new woman" by the only Shaw. To him she seems the very incarnation of the "new woman" of his clear imagination, whereas to others her chief charm lies in the fact that she is so very old. For is she not the one living descendant of that Nance Oldfield whom she plays with all the charming abandon of perfect familiarity and understanding? "Nance Oldfield as Miss Terry," as Shaw puts it; or Miss Terry as Nance Oldfield. It matters not which. But can we say the same of Lady Cicely Waynflete? That extremely up-to-date and adventurous bachelor maid (Shaw's very definite creation) as Ellen Terry? Or Ellen Terry as the confirmed old bachelor maid?

Mr. Shaw is human and has his illusions—like the rest of us—and he thinks he wrote Lady Cicely for Miss Terry; he thinks he has given her exactly the kind of part she should have been playing all those years at the Lyceum, instead of old-fashioned Olivias and Margarets. He thinks she thinks so too! But Ellen Terry is on record as saying, "I consider myself very happy and fortunate in having nearly always been called upon to act very noble, clear characters, since I prefer that kind of part, and love Portia and Beatrice better than Hedda, Nora, or any of those silly ladies. According to Shaw, Miss Terry personally is a kind of "superwoman"—a creature all cool intelligence and curiosity, of the requisite hardness, yet not unsympathetic, strong, firm, etc. etc. We are all familiar now with that very interesting possibility. But is it so? Charles Reade, who certainly knew a thing or two about women,—and Ellen Terry well—once said of her, in a burst of enthusiastic affection: "She is impulsive, intelligent, weak, hysterical—in short, all that is abominable and charming in women. Ellen Terry is a very charming actress. I see through and through her. Yet she pleases me all the same. Little Duck!"—Current Literature for September.

DECREE OF MAFIA.

Lone Mountaineer Killed by Agents of Dread Italian Society.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 4.—Lugi Marcucchi who was found dead last Thursday in his lonely cabin six miles from Galt, is now believed to have been a victim of the Mafia.

Marcucchi was found by ranch hands seated upon a beer keg in his cabin, his head resting upon a table from which the blood still trickled to the floor. It was believed at first that he had died from a hemorrhage, but when the blood was washed away last evening by the coroner, bullet wounds were found in the back of his head.

At the inquest today the men who discovered Marcucchi's dead body testified that they found the window closed and the door closed and securely fastened on the outside. The assassin had evidently fired upon Marcucchi from the doorway of his cabin. Marcucchi's two hunting dogs had been shut up in the cabin with his dead body.

The district attorney in advancing the theory that Marcucchi was murdered by the Mafia, argues that the well-known poverty of the victim precluded the possibility of robbery as a motive.
