## AS MONEY GIVES OUT

Nan Patterson Has no Use for John Brittn.

## HE ENDS ALL WITH PISTOL

Pittsburg Doctor Could Not Stand to See the Fair Figured Nan Receiving Attention From Other Men—Takes Usual Route.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 5.—Dr. John Brittn of this city, who committed suicide in St. Louis yesterday, supposedly because he lost \$1500 in backing a massage parlor, is today reported to have sought death because of an infatuation for Nan Patterson. Dr. William Marlin, a friend of the suicide, received a letter today which Brittn had written the day before he took his life. While he refuses to make known the contents, he intimates that Brittn killed himself because Nan Patterson had scorned his attentions.

During Nan Patterson's recent sojourn in Pittsburg, which ended a few days ago they spent days together at the Willwood Inn, a roadside back of McKeesport, Brittn neglecting his business and spending all of his money in company with the former actress, who is still unacquitted of the murder of Caesar Young. Brittn was not wealthy by any means, and it did not take long to burn the small sum he had saved.

When Brittn was nearing the end of his string and there was no more money in sight, the woman, it is said, turned her attention to men who were more prosperous. In vain Brittn attempted to retain favor. It is said he was repeatedly rebuffed, and that finally the woman had openly insulted him and commanded him never to speak to her again.

Brittn took the trouble deeply to

heart, and a few days afterwards he left the city. Nothing was heard of him until news came yesterday from St. Louis that he had killed himself there. He was 42 years old.

## SETTLE HARVESTER SUIT.

Reported That Action to Drive Combine From Texas Will be Compromised.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 5.—A new turn was taken today in the suit of the state against the International Harvester Co. of America for more than \$1,000,000 penalties, and to drive the company out of Texas. Efforts were begun to settle the case out of court.

Indications, it is said, are that the efforts will succeed. The terms of the agreement, if one has been made, have not been made public. The attorneys of both sides have been in conference today at Houston.

## STRIKER LED BY WOMEN.

ANTWERP, Sept. 5.—Militian controlled the situation here today though the rioters attacked a number of freight cars in which the strikers were riding. 20 rioters were wounded last night by sabres or revolvers of the police. The men who took part with recent disorders were largely led by women.

## CHICAGO'S DEATHS.

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—Three hundred and sixty-seven deaths were reported to the coroner's office for investigation during the month which has just closed, which was ten fewer than for the same period of the preceding year. Thirty-one of these persons committed suicide, 27 were killed by railroads, 15 by street cars and 13 were murdered. Five persons died of tetanus.
