BANKERS VISIT IN ASTORIA

ARE ENTHUSIASTIC OVER FUTURE PROSPECTS FOR BIG CITY AND MAY INVEST—WILL VISIT HAMMOND AND THE JETTY.

G. L. MacGibbon, of the German-American bank of Portland, and J. M. Anderson, an expert banking man of St. Paul, Minn., are visiting in Astoria for a few days, and will look over the field here for investment. They arrived in the city yesterday and will probably visit Warrenton, Hammond, Fort Stevens and the famous Columbia River jetty during the next few days.

Mr. MacGibbon has been in Astoria before and asserted his belief that the city had a grand future before it as a commercial and shipping point. He commented favorably upon the work being done by the Chamber of Commerce in the way of boosting the city and said that the progressive spirit of a city's citizens had more to do with helping growth than any other thing.

"A city will be a long time growing to any size," he said. "If the people sit down and wait for others to come along and do the work. While it is probable that outsiders may do the building, it is only because of the natural advantages, which appeal to them, and make them desirous of helping out in a great growth and thereby increasing their business. Even then it will take years unless the natives of the city pull together with the right spirit, and make every effort to pave the way for progress."

"That Astoria is bound to be an important shipping point, I have not the least doubt. The Hill interests have purchased considerable land in Hammond and along the waterfront, and it is certain that they mean to do something in the way of building wharves and warehouses for shipping. The completion of the bridge across the Columbia at Vancouver will be followed, in my opinion, by active operations at this end of the line.

"This work will be completed within about 30 days and when the men are through I believe that they will be shipped down to Hammond to work on the terminals to be located there. The wheat of Eastern Oregon and Washington to be exported will undoubtedly be brought down on the north bank of the Columbia to Vancouver and then down to Astoria and Hammond for shipment."

Mr. Anderson, who has only been in the west a couple of days, is also impressed with the natural advantages of Astoria and its tributaries for a big seaport. He will make a close investigation of the district and may engage in business here.

"What strikes me as an important feature of living in the west," he said, enthusiastically, "is the healthy appearance of the people. You surely have a glorious climate here and I have already felt the benefit of the health-giving qualities of the atmosphere."

O. J. GRACE IN TOWN YESTERDAY.

Getting Ready for His Lecture on the Seawall in October.

Preparing for his lecture on the seawall proposition along the waterfront of Astoria, O. J. Grace, the well known Portland engineer, who has been building numerous skyscrapers in that city, was a visitor in Astoria yesterday. He was here to investigate the plan and stated that it was perfectly feasible.

The cost of the piling and other material required for the seawall, including all the details of the work have been gone over by Mr. Grace, who has made several visits to the city during the past few months to thoroughly investigate the plan. His visit yesterday was taken up by going over the waterfront from Tongue Point to Smith's Point as a final inspection.

His lecture has practically been completed and is ready for delivery, and his last inspection was partly for the purpose of considering the situation thoroughly. He was the guest of Frank Patton last night and he was a visitor at the Chamber of Commerce in the morning.

He will deliver his lecture on the seawall some time in October before officials of the Northern Pacific Railroad, and will give all facts and figures in connection with it. He states that while the cost of the seawall will run up to quite a figure, the saving in insurance rates by the improvement will make up the amount in a few years.
