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HENEY MAY RUN.
May Take Stump Against Fulton For Re-election.

PORTLAND, Sept. 19.—If Charles W. Fulton goes before the people as a candidate for re-election to the United States Senate, as he has said he will, Francis J. Heney declares he will come to Oregon and take the stump against him.

While on his recent visit to Portland the fiery Californian confided to several friends his intention of taking a land in Oregon politics, in the event the man who he asserts has opposed him and his policies in this state should again ask the people of Oregon for political preferment.

Rumors that Mr. Heney entertained such designs have been in circulation for some time. Even before the last coming of the famous prospector stories to that effect were rife, and they received confirmation at the hands of Mr. Heney himself while here.

Senator Fulton's relations, political and otherwise, with the leading lights of the old ring, which long reigned supreme in the politics of the state and ultimately became involved in the land-fraud exposes and several other things, of which it is understood the prospector has more or less knowledge, are said to be things in the abstract which Mr. Heney will talk about from the stump, in case he should feel called upon to go into the fight.

ABOUT THE STRIKE.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Superintendent Brooks of the eastern division of the Western Union Telegraph Company today issued instructions withdrawing the reservation "Subject to delay" which was placed on telegraph messages during the strike. The withdrawal extends to the territory east of Buffalo and Pittsburgh and north of Washington and includes the entire east.

FOUR BATTLESHIPS DUE.

Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Maryland and Colorado Expected.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19.—Rear Admiral Dayton, with the battleships West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Colorado, are expected to arrive from Honolulu today or tomorrow. After a short stay at Mare Island the ships will proceed to Magdalena Bay for target practice.

having caused the country to consider seriously the defects of existing city charters. But it should not be forgotten that the advocates of government by commission have heretofore failed to recognize three fundamental facts: 1—Mis-government in a democracy is due primarily to ignorance on the part of the general public as to official acts and community needs; 2—Mis-government by commission is possible because the commission plan of itself does not insure intelligence on the part of the general public as to government results and community needs; 3—Hundreds of communities in the United States, including New York City, are now being misgoverned by commissions.

While the commission idea of itself gives greater opportunity for clever graft and for concealed wastefulness and inefficiency and while of itself it affords no guarantee of an intelligent public, it is my belief that an informed electorate can accomplish more with a small commission idea will prove helplessly inefficient unless all cities adopting it add to their program, as has Des Moines, a system of accounting and recording and publishing the facts of government what will enable the general public to decide upon the efficiency of the commission and to choose between policies that it may propose.

NIPPON VESSEL HOVERS.

Residents of Killisnoo Disturbed Over Presence of Japanese Schooner.

SEATTLE, Sept. 19.—Residents of the fishing town of Killisnoo, Alaska, are greatly disturbed over the presence of a mysterious Japanese schooner, Satsuma Maru, a three-masted craft under the command of Captain Futschi and manned by a crew of thirty-four men. Futschi, formerly a captain in the Japanese navy, steadily declines to make known the mission of his vessel, which has been in Killisnoo since August 24.

HONOLULU, Sept. 19.—The United States cruiser squadron from the Asiatic station, consisting of the Maryland, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Colorado, sailed today for San Francisco.
