**FORGED PAPERS HELD BY BANK.**

**Farmer's & Driver's of Waynesburg, Pa. May Be Kept Closed By It.**

PITTSBURG, Sept. 20.—Forged paper may interfere with the plan to reopen the Farmer's & Driver's Bank at Waynesburg, Pa. Today the bank examiner, John B. Cunningham, who closed the bank last December, declared that he had found papers alleged to have been forged amounting to \$250,000. Of this \$175,000 had been rediscounted and was in other banks, while \$75,000 was in the Farmer's & Driver's Bank.

"The comptroller," he said, "will, no doubt, require the bank to assume responsibility for all forged paper found in the bank."

**BANDIT PURSUED BY RURALES.**

HAVANA, Sept. 20.—Wounded and deserted by most of his followers, Gil Calderon, one of the most notorious bandit chieftains Cuba has ever known, is trying to rally his scattered band of outlaws before the organization is completely broken up by the victorious rurales under Capt. Wayato. While successful in his recent engagements with Calderon's forces, Mayato has asked for reinforcements that he may exterminate the entire body of cut-throats.

The outlaws were surprised in camp on Envido hill in the Cienfuegos district and, although they fought desperately, lost thirty men, about two-thirds of their number, in killed and wounded. The rurales' loss was about a dozen men. Seven of the bands were captured and are in jail awaiting trial.

Calderon had a hair-breadth escape, and has thus far eluded the rurales, though he has been seen in several places since the fight. He was a major in the revolutionary army in 1906 and still professes to be commanding a force of revolutionists against United States domination.

**DROWNED IN LAKE.**

WENATCHEE, Sept. 20.—A young man by the name of McCormick was drowned on Saturday at Moses Lake. Little is known here regarding him or the accident, although he used to live here. His parents are well known here, although at present they reside in Leavenworth.

**CLAM CANNERIES.**

WESTPORT, Sept. 20.—A large amount of lumber has been piled on the wharf here for the purpose of rebuilding the clam cannery belonging to Mr. Halferty, which was burned to the ground a few months ago. His cannery at Aberdeen is running full time.

The two other canneries here are running full time, and employing full forces. There is plenty of clams and the canneries run full time, except when the weather is so stormy it is impossible to dig them.

**RIOTS IN FRISCO.**

**Attempt to Force Car Ordinance Arouses Trouble.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—There were numerous minor riots in the Southern and Mission districts last night as the result of an attempt by the police to force an ordinance signed to prevent the overcrowding of the street cars. When the police tried to carry out the orders, the passengers aware of the purpose and those perched on top of the cars, refused to vacate their positions. Disturbances occurred at a dozen places, but no one was seriously injured. It is the intention of the police to arrest all violators of the law if the ordinance is not observed.

**WOUNDED WITH PAPER BULLET.**

SPOKANE, Sept. 20.—While engaged in a sham battle at old Fort Wright, where the garrison of Fort Wright is now encamped, having gone there on a practice march, Private Loeffler of company B was struck in the face with a paper bullet discharged from a comrad's gun and was badly injured. He may lose his eyesight. He was brought to Fort Wright this afternoon for treatment.

In the sham battle Loeffler was one of the attacking party and was injured in storming the ramparts. One of the besieging party became too excited and fired while at close quarters.

**ORDERED TO FURNISH CARS.**

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 20.—The state railway commission today issued a formal order commanding the Willmar & Sioux Falls Railway Company to furnish cars at the stations along its line for the shipment of grain direct to Omaha. This follows the complaint of the Omaha grain exchange, made some time ago against the Great Northern road, as owner of the Willmar & Sioux Falls branch charging that it discriminates against Omaha in furnishing cars and making shipments of grain.

**NAVIGATION AT END.**

DAWSON, Sept. 20.—The last of the Northern navigation steamers from St. Michaels this year left there last Saturday with supplies for all the winter mail stations on the Yukon River. All freight coming from other Yukon points via St. Michael has been left at St. Michael. There may be one or two other boats of other lines which may come from Fairbanks, due at Dawson. Not more than three or four more boats will leave Dawson this year for Fairbanks.

**CARS KILL WOMEN.**

**Wreck in Frisco Has Disastrous Results—Motorman Placed Under Arrest.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—A Kentucky street car this afternoon crashed into a Santa Fe engine at the corner of Twenty-fifth and Kentucky, and one woman, Mrs. McLaughlin, was killed. Three others were seriously hurt, but all are expected to recover.

Mrs. McLaughlin was pinned between the locomotive and the street car, and nearly an hour elapsed before she was extricated. Motorman Antone Aftlin was placed under arrest. He stated the car was on a down grade and he was unable to control it with the brakes.
