LONG DISTANCE COVERED.

German Airship Travels 621 Miles and Wins Contest.

BRUSSELS, Sept. 21.—The long distance prize in the international balloon race was won by the German balloon, Pommern, piloted by Herr Erbslob. The Pommern came down at Bayonne, France, 621 miles from Brussels. Herr Erbslob was a competitor in the French Balloon race. The Swiss balloon and English balloon will probably tie for second place. All the balloons have been accounted for. The contest was given under the auspices of the Belgian Aeronautic Club. The balloon left this city September 15.

CHAMBERMAIDS SENTENCED.

TACOMA, Sept. 21.—Judge Snell today sentenced Miss May Case and Miss Florence Troope, the two chambermaids arrested Monday charged with stealing valuables from the Bonneville hotel, to the state reform school. Miss Case, who comes from a respectable family of Olympia, will be allowed to go home pending her good behavior. Prosecuting Attorney Rowland making showing to the court that she had been led astray by the Troope girl. Miss Troope comes from Puyallup.

FIX SCHOOL LEVY.

EVERETT, Sept. 21.—The board of education in this city has made a levy of eight mills for the coming year. The levy is one mill larger than last year, necessitated by the increased attendance, requiring additional teachers and rooms. The levy is based on an assessment of \$9,000,000 as against \$6,000,000 last year. The district is for the first time in many years on a cash basis.

GET MORE TERRITORY.

New Line in Alaska Lessens Canadian District.

DAWSON, Sept. 21.—International boundary surveyors, who have been delineating the Alaskan-Canadian line since June 13, have finished work for the summer and returned to Dawson. The advance party came down the White river on a raft; while others are coming out overland with horses.

The arrivals corroborate the report that the new line gives the Americans from 100 to 1000 feet greater slice than the original survey by Ogilvie.

Forty-mile River, Sixty-mile River and Poker creek are the principle mining streams crossed. There is no serious complaint now from the miners who are thrown from one country into another by a change in the line. The work is complete on the Yukon river to Ladue creek. A twenty-foot skyline has been cut and bronze monuments will be erected next year and the line finished to Mount St. Elias, which is at the southern end.
