TIRED OF FOREIGNERS' BELIEFS.

Church Feasts, Weddings and Funerals Reasons for Jollifications.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 23.—Tiring of frequent shutdowns caused by numerous holidays among the foreigners, orders have been placed by the big coke companies of the Connellsville region for 2000 English speaking workmen. Agents of the companies are in Pittsburgh and the east trying to fill the orders.

This is the beginning of a movement to eliminate foreign labor in the mines and coke works. In the calendar of the foreigners every feast day in their church is a holiday and they refuse to work. Weddings and funerals are also made reasons for jollifications. Frequently the holidays last the greater part of a week.

In the meantime the power plants at the works must be kept in operation, burning immense quantities of coal. This is all a dead loss to the operators.

RETURNS FROM ARCTIC.

Dr. Steffanson Tells of Search For the Northern Land.

SEATTLE, Sept. 23.—A special to the Times from Victoria says:

Dr. Steffanson of the Anglo-American Arctic Expedition has reached here from Alaska. He brings news that Captain Mikkelsen, Ernest Leffingwell and party are all well and at Herschel Island. Mikkelsen, Leffingwell and one other will make an attempt to find land in Beaufort Sea. They are making sledges out of the wrecked schooner Duchess of Bedford and will leave from a point on the boundary line between Alaska and Yukon. They are not very hopeful finding large tracts of land. Dr. Howe will bring the remainder of the crew home on a whaler.

AGAIN FAILS TO SWIM CHANNEL.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—Wolfe, the amateur swimmer, made another attempt to conquer the English Channel today, but gave up when within two miles of the French coast. He was overboard 1 1/2 hours.

CREW DOWN WITH BERI BERI.

Bark Foohing Suesy Put in at San Juan for Relief and Repairs.

SAN JUAN, P. R., Sept. 23.—The bark Foohing Suesy, Capt. J. E. Willem, 130 days out from Honolulu with a cargo of sugar for New York, was forced to put in at this port, a majority of her crew having been stricken with beri beri.

The sick men were taken to the military hospital. A new crew will be shipped here.

JAMAICA PLANS BOYCOTT.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Sept. 23.—The chamber of Commerce will meet Wednesday for the purpose of declaring a boycott against English insurance companies which carried risks on property destroyed in the fire that followed the earthquake here, and now set up as a defence in the suits against them that they are not liable owing to non-endorsement of co-insurances. The feeling against the companies is increasing daily.

TO RESTRICT EMIGRATION

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 23.—The chiefs of the first and second divisions of the Swedish army, Major-Generals Matern and Egglia, have applied to the government to ask the coming Riksdag for a law forbidding the emigration of men between 17 and 20 years of age, with a loss of inheritance rights as a penalty, and also for severe laws against emigration agents.

VEGETARIAN ON LONG WALK.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—To demonstrate the physical powers to be derived from a strict vegetarian diet, Dr. I. C. Kramer will leave Chicago tomorrow morning and begin a walk to San Francisco, 2200 miles. He will leave without a cent, and expects to earn his way by delivering lectures on vegetarianism and by organizing vegetarian societies.

GASOLINE LAUNCH EXPLODES.

George McPherson, of Agassiz, B. C., Is Drowned.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 23.—Geo. McPherson, of Agassiz, was drowned and the government launch, Salmo, lost, owing to a gasoline explosion aboard the little vessel while she was running on Harrison lake yesterday.

McPherson and T. Graham were the only persons on board when the accident occurred.

Graham states that the vessel took fire from the explosion and after a hard fight against the flames the men put out in a small boat, which they had in tow. Just as they were putting out the boat capsized. Both men hung on to the boat for some time, but McPherson took cramps and sank while Graham was rescued by Indians.

GALE SWEEPS NEWFOUNDLAND.

ST. JOHNS, Sept. 23.—The heaviest gale reported here in forty years swept the Newfoundland coast yesterday. Reports from settlements showed that five lives have been lost. Eleven fishing schooners and ships were driven ashore at various points or foundered at their moorings.
