WATERFRONT ITEMS

Steamer Lurline Makes a Remarkable Trip.

CAUSES SUPPRISE IN CITY

Leaves For Portland in the Morning and Gets Back at 5:45 O'clock—Transfers Freight at Goble and Does the Trick—Other Waterfront Notes of Interest.

Considerable interest was manifested on Commercial street, yesterday afternoon, when the steamer Lurline blew her whistle. She had left this city at about 5 o'clock, yesterday morning, and it was whispered around that Captain Larkin, the popular skipper, was going to beat the record. At 5:45 p. m. the whistle was heard, and recognizing the familiar toot the question was asked, "How did she do it?"

A twelve-hour record for a round trip is phenomenal but the Lurline didn't make it. She passed Tongue Point at 5:45. She arrived at 5:45, a 12-hour record.

Captain Larkins, when interviewed said "We made it all right but we did not go the distance. We met the Undine at Goble and transferred our freight and passengers. We came right back and we don't want anything that is not coming to us." This spoils a story of a record run.

The steam schooner Johan Paulson arrived in yesterday morning from San Francisco to load lumber.

The schooner Oliver J. Olsen, which is loading at the Hume mill for Guaymas, Mexico, will be ready to go to sea on Monday. Captain Crowe was down from Portland and after inspecting her gave her a clear underwriters clearance.

The steamer City of Panama left out Friday evening for San Francisco with freight and passengers. The Costa Rica, of the same line is due from San Francisco on Sunday.

The schooner Mable Gale, with a cargo of lumber from the Knappton mill for San Francisco, was towed to sea yesterday.

REID ANXIOUS TO COMMENCE

STRIVING TO COMPLETE AMICABLE ARRANGEMENTS TO START BUILDING AT THIS END OF LINE—FAILING HE WILL COMMENCE AT PORTLAND.

Word was received by the Chamber of Commerce yesterday from William Reid, secretary of the Portland-Oregon & Seacoast Railroad, stating his terms for the carrying of timber over the railroad when finished, in consideration of the granting of the 100-foot right of way to the summit.

He sent a long letter to Secretary Whyte, enclosing the terms granted to the Willamette Paper & Pulp Company to deliver its logs at the Lewis and Clark River, in consideration for granting the road right of way over its property. The letter was too long to publish and it was full of figures presented by the paper company on timber freight rates, which have been accepted by the railroad, and which will form the basis for rates for all other concerns handling freight by this road when finished.

Mr. Reid met Mr. Whyte in Portland on Thursday and they had a long conference, the result of which cannot be learned as yet. It has been ascertained, however, that the railroad officials are doing all they can to make amicable arrangements to start work on the road as early as possible at this end of the route first. Failing in this, Mr. Reid asserted that work would be commenced on the Forest Grove end, and in that case the road will not be running into Astoria for at least two years. By this move Portland will receive the benefit of the business of constructing the road.

ADDITIONS TO FACULTY.

Several New Instructors Appointed This Year.

EUGENE, Sept. 28.—There have been a number of additions to the faculty of the University of Oregon and new members who have taken the positions held by others who are either studying in the East or in Europe or have resigned.

Dr. R. C. Clark, formerly of the University of Pennsylvania, has been added to the historical department and is now filling that chair. Miss Julia Burgess, of Wellesley, is a new instructor in the English department, and James Gilbert, an Oregon graduate, who has taken advanced work in Princeton, in the department of economics. Trainer "Bill" Hayward is now physical director as well as track director.

Misses Mabel Cooper and Angeline Williams, former graduates, are new assistant instructors in the department of English literature, and Miss Mary Kent in the department of biology.

In the School of Music Mrs. Stephanie Schaecker and Mrs. Catherine Pope and Miss Alberta Campbell.

Mr. Gilbert will be the debating coach this year in place of Mr. Brodley of last year. Mr. Gilbert is a man who has had much experience, and should be a valuable aid.

The prospects are very good, all of the men of last year's team who did not graduate being back in college. Veatch and Galloway, however, will be very hard to replace as leaders.

James K. Yuman has been appointed the general Y. M. C. A. secretary at the university and will have general jurisdiction over the colleges in the Willamette valley. Dr. Lyman graduated from Whitman last June, and immediately entered Y. M. C. A. work. He is an old football player.

Next Friday night the men of the university will be addressed by Ivan B. Rhodes, of Portland. He is general secretary for the state.
