INDIANS ARE IN BAD SHAPE.

People Curious to See if They Will Trap Fish.

PRIEST LAKE, Idaho, Oct. 12.—A band of Kalispel Indians with Chief Antile at their head, have visited Priest Lake in the fall of every year for many years. They come at the time whitefish are "running" and by trapping several creeks tributary to the lake always manage to carry out a goodly supply of fish for the winter.

Recently a law has been passed prohibiting the catching of whitefish by any other means than those afforded by the use of hook and line. Since the Indians heretofore have come with the sole purpose of trapping fish, their presence now is the subject of much speculation and their first move is watched with much interest. Should they break this law arrests will follow and a test case will be made.

TORPEDO FLEET FOR COAST.

Many Small Fighters Will be About San Francisco.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Another war ship division will be created at San Francisco next spring or sooner, consisting of torpedo-boats, torpedo-boat destroyers and submarines. Secretary Metcalf said today that it had not been decided what officer would be elevated to command this flotilla. It will be reinforced by six torpedo-boat destroyers, comprising a second torpedo flotilla, commanded by Lieutenant Hutch I. Cone, which arrived today at Norfolk to be docked and repaired preparatory to beginning their journey to the Pacific Coast as the advance guard of the Atlantic battleship fleet. These vessels, it was stated definitely at the Navy Department today, are now under orders to proceed on their journey from Hampton Roads on December 1st. SAYS MILLS POLLUTE WATER.

New Jersey's Attorney-General Begins Action Against Somerville Plant.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Oct. 12.—Attorney-General Robert H. McCarter, on behalf of the state board of health, has brought suit in the New Jersey court of chancery against the Somerville Woolen Mills, owned and operated by Bacon & Co., woolen dealers of 92 Franklin street, New York. He has asked to have the court issue an injunction against the company restraining it from polluting Chambers Brook, a tributary of the Raritan River. The Somerville Woolen Mills, has a scouring mill at Pluckemin, six miles from here, and uses the water of the brook for cleansing its wool.

The bill charges that the company allows dye stuffs and washings from the wool to discharge into the brook, and alleges that such discharges tend to corrupt and impair the water of the Raritan River to the detriment of the inhabitants of the towns of Somerville and Raritan.

The state sewer commissioner has recently ordered the towns of Somerville, Raritan and Bound Brook to take their sewer systems from the Raritan before January 1, 1912. The mandates state that the object of the commissioner is to prevent the pollution of the Atlantic Ocean.
