MIDWAY TREATING TAILINGS.

Will Cyanide Some 7000 Tons From the Old Dump.

TONOPAH, Oct. 14.—The old tailing at the Midway mill are being treated this week. Superintendent E. A. Julian said this morning that from 7000 to 9000 tons of the old dump would be cyanided, and that the time required for this work would be about five months.

After this has been reworked a later dump of several thousand tons will be tested and run through the mill, if found to carry sufficient values to justify it.

Just what values the tailings now being worked carry, Mr. Julian was reluctant to state, but it is understood from other sources that the values will average about \$10 to \$12 a ton.

The dirt is mixed thoroughly with water and pumped into the mill and cyanided which is the only process required for the extraction of the values, as is already thoroughly pulverized, having been treated by amalgamation a couple of years ago. In that method of treating the ores, a great amount of copper sulphates were used, and it was feared that the presence of this metal in the tailings would interfere considerably with cyaniding it, but Mr. Julian says that only a trace is discernible and works little or no harm.

The ore from the Midway is now being sent to the Desert Mill at Miller, which, it is learned, is making some improvements to facilitate the treatment of the increased receipts of ores. The improvements consist principally of extra slime tanks and additional concentrating tables.

GERMANY IN DARK.

Unable to Name Delegates Until Americans Arrive.

BERLIN, Oct. 14.—The news sent out some weeks ago that the Washington government had failed to notify the German authorities of the sending of the Cortelyou export commission to this country, brought forth instant returns. The omission was rectified by Ambassador Tower handing the foreign office a letter from Mr. Cortelyou in which he asked the German Government to nominate delegates to confer with him, and in all ways possible assist the American commissioners. It is learned now that the German government has sent a reply to the Washington authorities stating that it is still in the dark as to the purpose of the commission, and is therefore unable to nominate delegates before the arrival of the American commissioners. The commission originated from the situation created by the Limoges porcelain case, in which the American appraiser's valuation was far higher than the declared export value. This case is still pending.

SWALLOWS FILL CHIMNEYS.

BEVERLY, Penn., Oct. 14.—The spectacle of a flock of more than 1000 swallows circling in the air last evening just before darkness created a general disturbance, and residents in the vicinity of Church and Copper streets rushed out into their yards to ascertain the cause of the noise. For fully an hour they watched the birds' actions. Finally the leaders of the flock made an inspection of the two chimneys and became masters of the surroundings. All night long the hours were made uncomfortable by the chirping and restlessness of the feather creatures. As there was no redress or relief, the Leak and Addis families passed a miserable night, fearing to go to sleep lest the birds might invade their rooms through the chimney holes. At the break of day the birds flew out of their roost and journeyed southward.

BIG FIRE IN TENEMENT.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Fire of unknown origin against which firemen from thirteen engine companies battled early today, destroyed a six-story brick building at 176 and 180 Grand street, causing a loss estimated at over \$200,000. Hundreds of families were driven from surrounding tenements in a pouring rain and were not permitted to return to their homes until after 3 a. m., when the firemen finally succeeded in getting the flames under control.


