**WIRELESS EQUIPPED**

Steamship Roanoke is First on the Columbia.

SENDS FIRST MESSAGE HERE

Hears the News From All Along the Coast—Steamer Elder of Same Line Will be Similarly Equipped at Once—Notes Along the Waterfront.

"Via North Head, Oct. 21, 1907. "S. S. Roanoke Wireless, "C. H. Callender.

"Astoria, Ore.—Roanoke first steamer into Astoria with Massi wireless; will arrive Astoria 4 p. m., with 23 tons. "CAPT. DUNHAM."

This far the message received yesterday at the Callender dock and announced that the steamship Roanoke, the first steamer to enter the Columbia river equipped with wireless telegraph was coming.

At about 4 o'clock she arrived at the Callender dock with a fair cargo of freight and passenger list.

The steamship Roanoke was equipped with the apparatus at San Francisco and all the way up the expert who was installing it was putting the finishing touches on.

On Sunday they began to pick up messages and not until yesterday was the first message sent which was to this city.

Capt. Dunham was very enthusiastic over the success of the wireless on his ship and said it would go a long way to relieve the monotony of a sea voyage and also be of a great value in case of accident.

Sunday night they picked up a message from the steamship President on her way from Nome to Seattle and then 540 miles from them she reported good business. Everybody well aboard and expected to be in Seattle this morning. They also heard a message from Washington being relayed by Mare Island to the West Virginia in Santa Barbara channel, also a message was received yesterday afternoon from San Francisco telling about the street riots.

The Roanoke has aboard apparatus for the steamship Elder and it will at once be put aboard of her. The Roan-

oke expects to sail on her return trip Friday morning at 9 a. m.

The steamship Nicomedia, Capt. Wagemann, master, arrived late Saturday night in the lower harbor. The Nicomedia sailed from Yokohama for Astoria on October 2. When a week out, she encountered a hurricane of great severity. Fortunately it was in her favor, or she would not have fared so well. It carried her along at a great pace, but she shipped mammoth seas. Oil was freely poured on the troubled waters, and had it not been for this precaution the officers say the cabins and everything else on deck would have been swept away. Every portable article not made securely fast was lost overboard. The storm continued with unrelenting fury for four days. A less staunch craft would have been wrecked, is the opinion of those who made the voyage.

But notwithstanding the unfavorable elements, the steamer averaged 10 1/2 knots an hour crossing the Pacific, completing the passage from Yokohama in 17 days. The cargo is not very large, but valuable. She lost two men overboard on the last trip, one going and the other coming.

Captain Borgman of the bark Sea King reports that on September 4, 07, in lat. N. 53 deg. 05 min., long. W. 164 deg. 15 min., he sighted what was apparently a vessel bottom up, about 30 feet long at the water's edge and round topped to a height of 10 feet. Captain Borgman passed about two miles west of the derelict but owing to a strong E. N. E. wind and a drizzling rain he could not make out the character of the derelict. This is dangerous to navigation.

The steamer R. D. Inman arrived in Sunday from San Francisco and after discharging freight at the Callender dock left across the river for Knappton where she will take on a cargo of lumber.

The steamship Elder which expected to sail from San Francisco yesterday will not sail until Friday. Word to that effect being received at the Callender dock yesterday.

A square rigger was reported outside yesterday and it is thought she is the British ship Rajore out 163 days from London with a general cargo.

The United States lighthouse tender Armeria returned Sunday from British Columbia with a cargo of coal for the lighthouse department.

The steamer Cascaes arrived in yesterday from San Francisco and will load lumber for return trip.

A. G. Pace is the new superintendent of construction in this lighthouse district, and went on duty yesterday.

The schooner King Cyrus arrived in last evening and will load lumber for California.

**Too Much For Them—**

The Astoria football team returned Sunday from Corvallis where they went down to slaughter. The boys were weakened by Bays and Minard crippled on the start but put up a game fight, but the odds were too much against them. They report splendid treatment from the college boys who, in the evening, gave a banquet and dance in their honor.




