WATERFRONT ITEMS IS WELL KNOWN IN ASTORIA

The steam schooner John Paulsen came down the river yesterday morning. She has a lumber cargo for San Francisco.

The dredger Wm. S. Ladd moored alongside the O. R. & N. dock last evening, having come up the river from Smith's Point, where she has been digging out the channel.

The German ship Siam was towed down the river yesterday and passed out bound for Australia with a cargo of lumber.

The steam schooner R. D. Inman, having taken on a part cargo of lumber at the Knappton mill, went up the river yesterday to finish loading.

The Costa Rica came in from San Francisco yesterday morning, and after discharging freight proceeded to Portland.

The steamer Harvest Queen picked up the schooners Alvina, Muriel and King Cyrus yesterday morning and took them in one tow up the river, where they will load lumber.

Mariners are predicting that the first southwesterly gale, that blows up, will bring a considerable fleet of vessels in port. Quite a number of windjammers, headed for this port are overdue, and are strung out along the coast with no winds to help them along.

ABERDEEN BUSINESS MEN ARE MULETED BY W. H. GOWDY TO TUNE OF \$900—HE DID NEARLY AS WELL IN ASTORIA RECENTLY.

W. H. Gowdy was arrested in Aberdeen on October 19th on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. Gowdy invaded that city, with an advertising scheme, and succeeded in collecting a sum of money amounting to about \$900. His scheme was to publish a write-up of that portion of the country and he claimed to have the union labor sentiment back of him. One of his victims had him arrested, as he was about to leave the city, with his new bride, whom he had married in Aberdeen. He is out on \$500 bonds furnished by the bride, Ruby Scott.

Gowdy is well known in Astoria by several business men, who were muled by him for amounts varying from \$5 to \$20, on practically the same scheme. About the middle of August he appeared in this city, as a supposed representative of the Portland Labor Review, and solicited orders for copies of a special edition to be published on Labor Day. He used the same tactics, charged to him, at Aberdeen, and succeeded in securing many orders. His victims in this city received the write-ups promised but instead of the 100 to 300 copies, ordered, a sample copy was all that was received. When in this city he was arrested on suspicion but owing to the fact that no charge was preferred against him he was released on \$25 bail, a telephone message being received from the chief of police, at Portland, that the owner of the paper, he claimed to represent, said that he was authorized to solicit for that paper. He lost no time in leaving this city after the Astorian's exposure of his methods, accompanied by a woman with whom he was traveling, and whose jewelry he was wearing. He forfeited his bail. It seems that the game he worked in Astoria was repeated in Aberdeen with variations, but the result was far more disastrous to him. Astoria does not contain all the suckers. Shake, Aberdeen.

INSPECTS GOVERNMENT DOCK.

Colonel S. W. Roessler and Captain P. J. Werlich spent yesterday at the buoy depot, near the mouth of the Columbia River, making an examination of the dock on which a large quantity of coal is being stored. Some of the piling of the structure had begun to give way under the heavy load. After looking over the wharf, the government men decided to have the necessary repairs started as soon as possible. The dock will also be considerably strengthened. About 1000 tons of coal are being placed at that point for a reserve supply, in case that it should be difficult to get the fuel later in the season.

Work on the government jetty at the mouth of the Columbia River has not been progressing as rapidly as usual during the past week on account of the thick fog. Colonel Roessler says the barges, laden with rock, did not arrive from the quarry yesterday until 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Had the weather been favorable, he says they would have put in an appearance at 7 o'clock in the morning. Eight barges are engaged in transporting material to the jetty. Two are kept loading at the quarry, two in transit both ways and the same number discharging at Fort Stevens.

The dredge W. S. Ladd has been placed in service deepening the ship channel between Astoria and Flavel. Recently this part of the channel began to shoal in places and numerous complaints had been received by the United States engineers relative to its condition. But it is explained that the Ladd was otherwise employed until very recently, and she could not be spared for this work at an earlier date.

PORTO RICAN COURTS OBJECT.

Refuse to Be Governed by Insular Disbursement Law—Appeal to Bonaparte.

San Juan, P. R., Oct. 22.—There is a clash between the federal court authorities and the insular government, the former refusing to comply with the insular law regarding the disbursement of public funds. The insular government holds that the federal court expenses are different in character from those tribunals and that therefore the court must submit to the local disbursing laws.

No salaries or fees have been paid since July 1, and Judge Bernard S. Rodey of the United States district court threatens mandamus proceedings. He has cabled to Charles J. Bonaparte, attorney-general, what he intends to do. The case was submitted once before to the Department of Justice, but no decision has been rendered yet.


