DREDGER WRECKED

Steamer Bailey Gatzert Rams Dredge Portland.

PASSENGERS PANIC STRICKEN

Fortunately no Lives Are Lost—Chinese Cook Has Narrow Escape From Drowning—Gatzert Had Only Just Come Off the Drydock.

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—In a thick fog the steamer Bailey Gatzert rammed and sank the dredge Portland at Postoffice bar at 8:10 o'clock this morning. The dredge went down in three minutes after being struck, and her crew had narrow escapes. The 28 or 30 men she carried scrambled on board the Gatzert, as the Portland was rapidly sinking.

As he was trying to reach the steamer the Chinese cook went overboard and came near drowning before being picked up. About 300 passengers were on the Bailey Gatzert, and the officers had to work hard to prevent them from becoming panic-stricken. In the general excitement they ran about on deck, not knowing just what had happened. Impact of the collision threw many of them off their feet. Until they had been repeatedly assured that they were in no danger, did the woman passengers regain their composure.

Captain Frederick Sherman was at the wheel of the Gatzert at the time of the accident. He says the dredge was lying directly across the channel, and though a thick fog overhung the river, she sounded no signals. When the heavy outlines of the dredge became visible. It was too late for the Gatzert to change her course, declares the skipper. The dredge was struck in the port stern by the steamer's bow. As she went down so quickly, it is judged that a hole was ripped off the greater part of the length of her hull below the water line. Damage sustained by the Gatzert was above the water line on the starboard side. The hole torn in her is about six feet long and 18 inches wide. Had it been a trifle lower she would also have filled with water and occupied a position alongside the dredge, whose housetop shows above the surface of the water. Until she has been raised and removed the channel will be blocked to deep-water navigation.

Postoffice bar is at the mouth of the Willamette River, and has been in bad shape for the past two or three months. To get it deepened shippers have been clamoring for a number of weeks to have one of the dredges sent there. In answer to these appeals the Port of Portland sent the Portland there yesterday. She arrived only last night, and was preparing to go to work when overtaken by disaster.

The Bailey Gatzert had just been repaired, after having been disabled and sunk by running on a reef of rocks near Washougal, November 1. She came from the drydock yesterday, and left her dock at the foot of Alder street at 7 o'clock this morning on the first trip she had made since her previous experience at Washougal. It is said that she carried all of 300 passengers, many of whom were women and children. More than half of them were Portlanders who were going to The Dalles on business. Others lived at various points along the upper Columbia River and were returning to their homes.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Edward Lauterbach, counsel for R. & O. E. Thomas, who have agreed to return \$100,000 cash and \$1,000,000 in notes to the syndicate of Philadelphians which had bargained for the purpose of the Provident Savings Life Insurance Society, said today that the details for the final settlement of the rather complicated deal are far from finished, and that many days will doubtless be required before the negotiations come to a close.

Mr. Lauterbach said although a conference will be held today in the office of Ex-Judge Morgan J. O'Brien, counsel for the syndicate, there is small probability that anything of a definite nature will be agreed upon. John J. Coyle, head of the syndicate and ex-judge Batch, of Utah, will also attend the conference.

NOT SETTLED YET.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Dr. Rudolph Hering of New York, now employed by the sanitary district, who has been investigating the probable effect on the lake level of an additional inlet to the drainage canal, says it will not lower the lakes.

NOT LOWER LAKE LEVEL.

The report is to be made in the suit started by the Government restraining Sanitary District Commissioners from constructing an additional outlet. The suit was started on the ground that the additional canal would lower the level of the lakes.

Dr. Hering says that from the investigation which he has made the contention of the government is unfounded and from data which he has gathered he will show that by using lake Superior as a storage place and by the use of the dams at Sault St. Marie the Michigan and Huron lake levels can be maintained.

ATTEMPTS LIFE OF PRINCE.

Bomb Thrown at Acting Governor of Vyatka Falls to Explode.

NYATKA, Russia, Nov. 6.—As Prince Gortchakoff, the acting governor of Vyatka, was driving from the cathedral here at noon today, a bomb was hurled at his carriage, but failed to explode. The perpetrator of the outrage then attempted to shoot the prince, but a Cossack soldier of the guard shot and killed the would-be assassin, who was an ex-student of the local high school.

CONSOLIDATE LINES.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The annual meeting of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company will be held here today. Besides the election of directors, the chief business to be transacted is the consolidation of 19 subsidiary lines now being operated by the company in Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado and Wyoming. So far as was apparent last night there would be no contest of any nature. There are 11 members of the board of directors, each holding office for one year. The subsidiary lines which are to be absorbed have a trackage of about 2000 miles.

CLOTHIERS INSOLVENT.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Vavid and Isaac Loeb, & son, filed a petition in bankruptcy yesterday in the United States Court. The Loebes were engaged in the wholesale clothing business. They assert their liabilities amount to \$69,306, with assets of \$10,140.

BREWER BUSCH RETURNS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Recovered in health almost to the point of convalescence and optimistic as to the financial outlook in the U. S. Adolphus Busch, the St. Louis brewer, has arrived in New York from Europe. Mr. Busch went abroad in May and since that time has suffered a severe illness, but is almost entirely recovered.
