**Personal Effects Sold—**  
The personal effects of the late Walter Jorgensen, mate of the schooner Annie M. Campbell, who was killed while in discharge of his duties, a few days ago, were sold yesterday and the amount turned over to the custom's department. Wages due him and the sum realized from the sale, amounting in all to States district court at Portland and States district court at Potriand and held in trust for the heirs of the deceased. The only relative as far as known is an aunt, Mrs. Christina Jorgensen, of Copenhagen, Denmark.

**In the Chief's Hands—**  
Chief of Police Gammal found it necessary yesterday to lay his official hands on a stray lad from Portland by the name of George Beagle, who has been in this city for several days without any apparent home or sustenance of any kind. The Portland authorities have been notified of the detention of the youngster, and it is expected word will be sent here ordering his proper disposal. The kid is notably tough and the restraint put upon him by Chief Gammal will do him good in more ways than one.

**First Official Step—**  
Yesterday the articles of incorporation of the Clatsop Fuel Company, the concern that owes its existence to the agitation here for the initial development of the oil and gas interests of this county, and the authority of the Astoria Chamber of Commerce, were filed with County Clerk Clinton. The state filing in this behalf has been made at Salem, but is held in abeyance pending the cessation of the emergency holidays promulgated by the governor. The capital stock is placed at \$15,000 and the shares number 15,000, thus fixing the par value thereof at \$1.00. The incorporators are Dr. J. A. Fulton, George W. Sanborn and W. C. Logan.

**Hindus Are Students—**  
It is credibly reported by one in close touch with the daily life of the 12 Hindus now working at the Tongue Point Lumber Mills, that these men are devoted students, and put in all their spare time at the studies prescribed for them by the Correspondence Schools they are patronizing; that they are steady workers, exceedingly tidy in their habit of living, quiet and unobtrusive, and "butt in" on no one nor anything that does not particularly concern them; and that they are guided in all their pursuits and activities, outside their regular work, by one of their number, who is their interpreter, and agent, in all relations.

**No Flagstaff, No Flag—**  
By one of those oddities of human curiosity, the question has been raised here in Astoria, as to why there is no flagstaff provided for Clatsop's beautiful new court house? Inquiry in this behalf develops the fact that none has been intended and was left out of the plans altogether. For this fact Mr. Dougan, the contractor, is authority, but Judge Trenchard was not available for its confirmation when the reporter called on him yesterday, and the Astorian is at a loss to signify what the ruling may mean. If it prevails, Clatsop will have the only court house in the state without such an appendage. Many people find it difficult to realize the reason for the rule as it is so invariable everywhere; and the major presumption in the premise is that if there is no staff there will be no flag, and this does not commend itself with any ordinary loyal American.
