

BIDS FOR BARRACKS OPENED

ASTORIA FIRM OF FERGUSON & HOUSTON ARE LOWEST BIDDERS AND WILL UNDOUBTEDLY SECURE CONTRACT.

The bids for the construction of a barracks building at Fort Stevens, were opened in the office of the quartermaster's department of the army this afternoon. The specifications also called for plumbing, heating, wiring and electrical fixtures. Eight bids were submitted for consideration as follows:


