Big Fleet in Port of Astoria Yesterday.

OCEAN LINERS READY FOR SEA

Columbia Bar on Bit of a Rampage—Oil Squadron in Evidence Yesterday—Coastwise Traffic Lively—Other Dock Notes.

Manager Charles Humphreys, of the Postal Telegraph Company, has installed at his Commercial street office, a very handy blackboard chart upon which is recorded the movement of all vessels touching at this port every day; where they hail from, destination, flag, in, or out, up river, or down, departures, and dockings, with all other detail needed in the premise. It is a great convenience and is widely appreciated by those to whom such information is essential during the day.

Captain Ed Sullivan, formerly master of the pride of the Columbia, the Potter, and also of the Harvest Queen has resigned from the O. R. & N. service altogether, and entered the Columbia River Pilots' Association, a post he is thoroughly qualified to fill. He was succeeded on the Queen by Captain C. J. Anderson, of the Oklahoma, and he in turn, on the latter steamer, by Captain Pearson.

There was quite a fleet in evidence in this port yesterday, the major part of it passing, or stopping, here, during the afternoon; the intermittent, but dense fogs, and the "rough-house" bar, held the sea-bound contingent on the hither side of North Head, but the Portland-bound craft were taken in charge by the river pilots and swung on up the Columbia.

Captain Charles T. Bailey, of the sea tug Tatoosh, who has been confined to his room for the past fortnight by an injury received to his leg, expects to take over the command of his fine steam-

er this morning, relieving Captain M. D. Staples who has been in full charge during Captain Bailey's enforced idleness.

The fine American steamship Lyra, loaded with general cargo, for New York came down from Portland yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock and went below for an anchorage. She will probably get away today on her long voyage.

The motor schooner Berwick which arrived in from Wedderburn, on the Rogue, yesterday morning, discharged what of freight she had for this port, and left up for Portland at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The big Asiatic liner Alesia arrived down from Portland yesterday afternoon and went to an anchorage in the lower harbor, to await the subsidence of a humpious bar, when she will depart for the Orient.

The French bark Briseau, wheat laden for the United Kingdom, is due down from Portland today on the tow lines of the Oklahoma, and will take the earliest possible despatch for sea.

The British ship San Miren, which arrived in from Australia, with a 3000-ton coal cargo from Newcastle, N. S. W., on Monday evening will proceed to Portland on the hawsers of the Harvest Queen today.

The steamer Daisy Freeman was among the afternoon arrivals from sea yesterday, and she docked at the Callender pier for a short while before continuing her up-river journey to Portland.

The steamship Breakwater, bound for Coos Bay, with passengers and freight, is due to arrive down from Portland at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning, and will leave out at 6:30 o'clock.

The oil tank steamer Lansing came down from Portland yesterday forenoon, and is in the lower harbor waiting for the bar to moderate a bit before sailing for the California coast.

The oil tank steamer Monterey arrived in from California yesterday afternoon and went on to the metropolis in charge of Captain Patterson, of the river pilots' association.

The Callender steamer Wenona is "making her toilet" at the company's dock, and will soon be respondent in

glistening paint, when she will resume her Gray's River run.

The steam schooner Yellowstone, lumber laden from Portland, for San Francisco, arrived down early yesterday morning and passed out on her coastwise journey at once.

The steamer Northland came in yesterday afternoon from San Francisco, and after leaving 84 tons of freight at the Callender pier, went on to Portland.

The doughty little Della, Captain Jones, has loaded for the return voyage to Nescueca, and will get away as soon as the seas get down to her size.

The steamship Geo. W. Elder is due down tomorrow morning for San Pedro, and San Francisco, with a big list of passengers and plenty of freight.

The British steamship British Monarch is due down today from Portland, laden with wheat for the United Kingdom. She will leave out at once.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore is discharging cargo, from Tillamook Bay, at the A. & C. docks, and will load out again without delay.

The oil tank steamer Asuncion was due in from the lower coast of California last evening, but will hardly make before this morning.

The steamer Alliance is due down from Portland this morning, and will leave out for Coos Bay points without any loss of time.

The British steamship Aukeneira left up for Portland yesterday at noon, having arrived in from the Sound on the morning flood.

The steamship City of Panama, for San Francisco, is due down in the morning, and will depart for the Bay City at 6:30 o'clock.

VIOLATE POSTAL LAWS.

Patrons of Tobacco Company Are Liable to Fines.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Two thousand cases of violation of the postal laws, the majority of them traced to patrons of a tobacco company of St. Louis are on file in the office of Postoffice Inspector James E. Stuart.

Mr. Stuart protested yesterday against the methods of the company and several other large concerns in the country, by which ignorant persons are led into breaking the laws and making themselves liable to \$10 fines when a few cents postage would evade all trouble. The law violated is section 484 of the postal regulations.

Patrons of the Tobacco Company in Chicago and other cities break this law by sending tags back to the company as fourth class matter, with a written request in the same package for the kind of premiums desired. The Tobacco Company in the past has asked the tag senders to designate the premiums wanted. The writing in the package places the matter in the first class.

NO DIVORCE LAW.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 12.—Judge Clement of the Supreme Court yesterday decided in an argument on a stated divorce suit that there was no operative divorce law in British Columbia at the present time. He holds that the law administered during the years since British Columbia joined the confederation and which was in effect when this province was a crown colony, cannot now be operative.
