REPAIR EQUIPMENT

Car Shops Overloaded With Broken Down Cars.

COAL CARS IN GREAT DEMAND

When Business Resumes Normal Stage Railroads Will be Unable to Provide Rolling Stock—Much New Equipment is Being Ordered.

CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—While there are no longer complaints of a car shortage the officials of Western lines do not think the danger of one is past. It is their opinion that when confidence is restored business will be resumed on a much larger scale and the roads will be unable to meet the demands which will be made upon them. To prepare for this the car shops are overloaded with repair work. Thousands of cars which heretofore were in such demand that they could not be sent to the shops until the great fall rush was over are now being overhauled and put in storage. Moreover, so far as known, no orders for new equipment have been cancelled.

There is still a strong demand for coal cars and vast quantities of fuel are pouring into the Northwest. The railroad men hope the bulk of this business will be disposed of before the general call for cars to move the crops is made. There is the wheat crop of the Northwest and the corn crop of the Southwest to be reckoned with. As yet little of this has been moved and the longer it is held in the country the more urgent will be the demand for cars.

GETS LARGE SUM.

Successful Jockey Presented With \$12,000 Check by Owner.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Walter Miller, the most successful jockey in America, this year, as last, has received from James R. Keene a check on the National City Bank for \$12,000.38, this being five per cent of the money the jockey won for Mr. Keene this year. Miller has ridden 50 winners for Mr. Keene and the total amount of money won in these races was \$245,497.75.

Including the fees from Mr. Keene, this 19-year-old boy will have earned before January first next not less than \$50,000. He has ridden 852 races and won 224 since the commencement of the season.

Miller will leave today for California, there to resume riding for Thomas H. Williams.

THREE NEW BOATS.

Japanese Steamship Line to Put on More Steamers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—M. Shiraiishi, general manager of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha, arrived here today from the Orient on the Japanese liner Hongkong. In regard to the vessels about to be added to the line now running to San Francisco, Mr. Shiraiishi said:

"We are to have three boats of the type of the new 13,500-ton vessel just launched. The third one has been ordered. It will be completed in 1909. All of them will be built at Nagasaki.

These three sister ships, each of 13,500 gross tonnage, will be in the service with those now on the run to and from San Francisco. There is no idea of extending our service to any other coast port.

CAPTURE CROOKS.

Detectives Arrest Men Accused of Robbing Jewelry Store.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—Local detectives captured yesterday Jos. Brown and Nathan Stone, two eastern race-track touts and all-around crooks, who robbed a Redding jewelry store of \$750 worth of goods last Sunday night. Quantities of the gems were found in the pockets of the men and more loot was discovered in their room here. The police say that both men have eastern reputations and believe that they intend to ply their trade here during the racing season. Their capture is regarded as an important one. The men will be sent back to Redding this afternoon.

PAT CROWE IN TOILS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Pat Crowe, who gained fame through the kidnaping of one of Packer Cudahy's children several years ago, is being detained here by the police in connection with the murder of Policeman McAneny, who was shot and killed early this morning. The case is shrouded in mystery. Crowe heard that the police were seeking him and surrendered at police headquarters. No formal charge has been placed against him. The policeman was killed on his way home from Englewood station. It is supposed that he stopped and questioned the highwayman, who fired the shot.

OPTIMISM CLUB.

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 16.—To organize optimism is the purpose of a society which numbers Governor John C. Cutler among its officers. "The Optimists Club" was started here yesterday by members of the Commercial Club who think this a suitable time to promote the gospel of cheer. Commercial bodies the land over, Governors of States and the President will be asked to identify themselves with the society. Governor Cutler has consented to act as chairman of the executive committee.

OPPOSE GOVERNMENT.

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 16.—After a hot fight the Federation of Labor declared its opposition to the government ownership of railroads and mines, by a vote of 154 to 50. The Federation stands pat in its opinion that telephones should be controlled by the government.
