PORTLAND, March 7.—There have been two advances of 10 cents a hundred each in sugar in the East within the past two weeks, and local jobbers say that higher quotations here within a short time may be expected. No changes were announced today. An Eastern trade paper gives the following figures on the world's visible sugar supply: "Total stock of Europe and America, 5,577,777 tons, against 3,747,719 tons last year at the same uneven dates. The decrease of stock is 1,694,228 tons, against a decrease of 157,984 tons last week. Total decrease of 157,984 tons last week. Total stocks and afloats together show a visible supply of 3,677,777 tons, against 3,837,719 tons last year, or a decrease of 159,942 tons."
