WATERFRONT ITEMS
YESTERDAY

GRIST OF MARINE MOVEMENTS FOR PAST TWO DAYS ON THE RIVER, IN THE BAY AND OVER THE BAR.

The steamer Shoshone, Captain Asplund, arrived in and went on to Rainier yesterday. On the way up she picked up a couple of fishermen whose boat had capsized in the lower harbor and brought them to the city. The boat and nets were picked up by a passing launch later in the day.

The steamship Rose City arrived in early yesterday morning with over 200 people in her steerage and 70 in her cabins. She will return down, and out, from Portland, on Saturday afternoon next.

The steamship Roanoke will come in from California coast late tonight or early tomorrow morning and will lay here until she has done her "Battleship" cruise, tomorrow.

The fine oil tank steamship Santa Maria entered port on Sunday morning last and went on to Portland at once.

The schooner Virginia was among the Sunday arrivals from San Francisco and will go up the river for a load of lumber today.

The schooner King Cyrus entered port from the Bay City on Sunday last and will go to Knappton for her outward cargo.

The steamer Nome City arrived in from San Francisco yesterday and went on to the metropolis after a brief stay at the Callender docks.

The steamship Hornelin arrived down from the metropolis yesterday, and went on to Tacoma, where she will finish loading and then sail for Panama.

The Kamm boat Undine will resume her interrupted service today, coming down from the metropolis on her usual schedule this afternoon.

The motor schooner Condor, laden with miscellaneous cargo, is in port, and will leave out for Alsea as soon as the bar permits.

The steamship Yeddo is due in at the Tongue Point mills this morning, to load out lumber for Samoa and Sydney, Australia.

The Olympic got away from the Tongue Point mills dock yesterday and went to sea and San Francisco, with 700,000 feet of lumber.

The steamer St. Helens came down on Sunday and went to sea and the Bay City after a short stop here at the Callender.

The steamship Breakwater was a Sunday arrival from Coos, and went on to Portland without delay here.

The steamship Melville Dollar came in from the Bay City on Sunday morning last and went to Portland.

The steamer Alliance, Captain Olsen, was among the departures of Sunday last, leaving out for Coos Bay points.

The oil tank steamer Atlas came down from Portland on Sunday and left out for San Francisco.

The French bark Rostand went up the river yesterday on the towlines of the steamer Harvest Queen.

COMMON COUNCIL IN SESSION

PETITIONS, REMONSTRANCES, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS RECEIVE PROMPT ATTENTION FROM CITY FATHERS—ROUTINE BUSINESS ONLY MARKED THE SESSION

The regular meeting of the common council was held last evening with Mayor Wise in the chair and all councilmen present.

The minutes were read and approved. Attorney C. J. Curtis appeared for the 45 signers for an amendment to ordinance No. 1902 and it was read first and second time. Final action will be taken on it at the next meeting. The following business was transacted:

Petition.

From Henry Sherman and 44 others asking that ordinance 1902 be amended. Health and police and city attorney.

From H. M. Lorentsen and others asking that W. A. Goodin be granted an extension of time for the construction of Irving avenue from 18th street to east line of Shively's so that he may be able to improve Irving avenue from east line of Shively's to 40th street in time to enable persons living in that vicinity to get their winter's fuel hauled on said street. Granted.

From F. Cook and Enquist Hendrickson & Co. for retail liquor licenses. Referred to committee on health and police.

Petition from Chas. Veschuren and others asking for the improvement of Irving avenue between 8th and 9th streets by grading to its full width, macadamizing and by the construction of a cement sidewalk on the north side. Granted.

Petition from J. E. Higgins and others asking that authority be given for the permanent improvement of 8th street from Harrison to Lexington avenue said street to be rocked full width and cement sidewalks wherever practicable. Placed on file.

Petitions from E. A. Gerding asking for an extension of sixty days in which to complete his contract on Irving avenue. Granted. Ordinance to that effect passed.


