The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Dec. 22.—In hides, as in most other lines the market is always quiet at this time of the year, and local dealers say the present dullness is likely to extend into January. The leather trade in a large way governs the hide market, and manufacturers generally at this season are closing the business of the year and preparing for that of the year to come. With the city retailers pretty well stocked with turkeys for the Christmas trade, the Front street market was comparatively quiet today, but the quoted prices, 22 to 25 cents a pound, were fairly well maintained. With the demand for the time chiefly for turkeys, stocks of hens and chickens on the street are considerably in excess of requirements and the market is a weak affair.
