

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, Feb. 15.—"There is little danger of the Oregon growers selling onions at prices under \$2 a hundred to any great extent this week," said a local dealer today.

"The meeting Saturday of the directors of the growers' association settled that if the markets in the South are being manipulated, as many believe, this action will not have any effect here so far as the producers are concerned.

"The sentiment of the growers generally is that the situation is now stronger on the whole than at any previous time this season, despite the recent bearish rumors emanating from the South, and the producers are confident that the operators who have endeavored to handle the Southern markets to their own advantage will very shortly discover that the law of supply and demand is a bigger factor in the trade than they are."

Though in some quarters eggs were reported to be worth 31 to 32 cents a dozen today, the general quotation on the street was 30 cents, and the outlook is for a still lower price in the near future.

In poultry, as usual Monday, there was little or nothing doing, and the last range of prices was maintained.

SUICIDE AT TACOMA. TACOMA, Feb. 15.—Karl Eggert, a German shoemaker, 55 years of age, recently arrived here from Oshkosh, Wis., committed suicide in a Pacific avenue hotel about 11 o'clock last night.

Eggert had remained in his room all day and refused to allow the door to be opened. While a policeman stood on a step ladder outside, looking through the glass of the transom, and three others stood near, he shot himself through the temple. In a conversation with the officers before shooting himself, Eggert said his son had a short time ago committed suicide in San Francisco. He was a widower and is believed to have been worth about \$20,000 in Oshkosh property.

DON'T WANT A TARIFF. CHICAGO, Feb. 15.—Protest against the placing of a duty on coffee has been sent to Washington by the roasters and retailers. Congressmen who represent this city have received petitions asking them to use their influence to prevent the sub-committee of the ways and means committee recommending a tariff. Information that reaches Chicago is that a serious effort is being made to raise a revenue by taxing imported coffee from two to five cents a pound.
