The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 23.—Standard city creamery butter dropped to 34 cents a pound today, and a similar decline in country creamery was announced, the latter being quoted at 32 to 34 cents. This cut occasioned no surprise, for it had been expected, and in some quarters that belief prevails that another reduction may be expected within the next week or two.

Coming at a time when current home production shows no surplus over requirements, when in fact some dealers are complaining of a shortage and inability to fill orders, this cut in prices might seem to be somewhat out of the ordinary, but that is not the case. For the past week or two the coast market as a whole has shown a weakening tendency, particularly in the South, and the movement of California butter to this market, which has already started, made the adjustment of prices necessary. A large shipment of California butter came in yesterday and another arrived today. On the street yesterday this product was quoted as 64 to 67 cents a roll, and this made it impossible to maintain the prices of the past few weeks on Oregon butter.

Eggs continue to move at 20 to 21 cents, but dealers today reported the demand in the North a little less strong than last week. In the event of a serious falling off in the northern demand stocks here are likely to increase materially and prices take another turn downward.

There was a good demand for everything in the poultry line today, and only moderate stocks to draw upon. Light receipts are expected for the remainder of the week.

Vegetables generally were plentiful today and prices all along the line were about the same as those of yesterday. One car of celery came in from the South, together with a small shipment of other stuff. Among the latter was a consignment of new Bay peas, the first of the season here, for the Pearson-Page Company. These were quoted at 12 1/2 to 15 cents a pound. Asparagus moved at 10 to 15 cents today, cabbage at \$3.25, cauliflower at \$2.75 and celery at \$4.50 a crate. New rhubarb is now selling at \$2.25 a box.
