OCEAN, BAR, BAY, DOCK AND RIVER

T. L. Driscoll & Company, the boat builders, are working a heavy force to clean up their numerous contracts. They expect to have the fine Millers' Sands fishing tender finished and in her element by the 10th of April. Yesterday they installed a three horsepower engine in the ship's boat from the British ship Donna Francisca; and another crew was busy on the fine bay launch Hulda I, while still another gang was employed on some dandy fishboats, for this year's use on the Columbia.

The force at the Wilson Bros' boatyard, is busily at work completing the dyking scow for the Columbia Agricultural & Dredging Company. It will be 24 feet by 50 in dimension, and have a 30 horsepower Atlas engine to drive it, both for navigation and for hoisting work and it is expected it will be ready for launching next week. The Wilson's are also building four new motor fishing boats for this season's use.

The following people are billed out on the steamship Rose City, which is due to sail for San Francisco today, from the O. R. & N. docks: Mrs. M. A. Gilbert and Miss A. Gilbert, in the cabin; and J. A. Green, Joseph Smith, Michael Miller, Frank Ekroth and T. Eastman, in the steerage.

The steam schooner Carmel, Capt. Doris, master, arrived in last evening from San Francisco. She comes to take the place of the wrecked steamer R. D. Inman and will take on a part cargo at Portland after which she will finish loading at Knappton.

There was a rumor on the streets here yesterday to the effect that the British vessel Clan MacFarland, bound for British Columbia ports, was in trouble off Cape Flattery, but nothing definite was obtainable at any sources of marine news.

When the Lurline went up last evening the following names figured on her passenger list: Robert Adams, Mrs. Jack Day, L. R. Morcan and Mrs. Van Teyl.

The steamer Alliance left Coos Bay Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, with plenty of business, and crossed in last evening, docking at the Callender to discharge some freight, before leaving up stream.

The ship Henry Villard finished coaling at the Elmore bunkers last night, and will be hauled to the A. & C. docks this morning, there to take on her season's cargo for Nushagak, in the interests of the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company.

The steamer Argo arrived in last evening from Tillamook.

Kansas City is the name of the new steamer which R. P. Schwerin, vice-president and general manager of the Harriman water lines, has purchased in New York to operate out of Astoria in conjunction with the Rose City, according to a message received from San Francisco by the Merchants' Exchange this morning. She will be brought around from the Atlantic coast as quickly as possible by Captain Kidston, who went East for the purpose a month ago. The Kansas City is so near the size and build of the Rose City that they could easily be mistaken, for sister ships. She is of 2164 tons net register, while the Rose City is of 2154 tons. In dimensions she is also about the same, being 327 feet long, 45 feet beam and 18.8 feet depth of hold.

The ship St. Nicholas will come out of winter berth, in Young's Bay this morning, and go to the Elmore bunkers, and in a day or two will berth at the Kinney dock for general loading for the north in the interests of the Columbia River Packers' Association.

The British bark Carmanian, Captain G. G. Green, has arrived down, loaded with lumber for Queenstown, and will probably leave out this morning.

The steamer Alliance arrived in last evening from Coos Bay with a full passenger list and freight cargo.

Man Springs From Train Going 40 Miles An Hour, For Liberty.

BUTTE, Mont., March 26.—Local officers were apprised last night of the escape of H. C. Belmont, who has a long string of aliases from Sheriff C. B. Coulter, of Crawford, Ill., at Sand Peak Colo., Belmont jumped through the window of the toilet room of the car while the train was going forty miles an hour and thus far has eluded capture. Belmont had been operating in Butte as a fortune teller under the name of Professor Alvani and was arrested here for an alleged confidence game at Robinson Ill. Belmont is supposed to have made his way into Denver.

BIG SCHOOLS IN DEBATE

PRINCETON, N. J. March 26.—A lively interest is manifested in college circles in the triangular debate tonight between representatives of Harvard, Yale and Princeton universities. The question which will be discussed by all three institutions is "Resolved, that all corporations engaging in interstate commerce should take out a Federal charter."

HE HELD A BAD ACE

Cheating in Poker Game Ends In Some Shooting.

PITTSBURG, March 26.—A poker game at Clairton, a few miles from here, broke up about daybreak after a second ace of diamonds was discovered in the deck. Peter Marsh, who held the two aces, of diamonds, as well as an ace of hearts and an ace of clubs, is in McKeesport Hospital with two bullet holes in his lungs. It is said he cannot live. There were seven others in the room at the time this happened and six of them were hurt by the flying bullets and furniture. The man who is said to have done the shooting, on having his skull beaten, escaped.
