ALL ABOUT THE CHAMPION KID SLUGGER AND HIS CONTESTS.

CHICAGO, April 22.—There will be no bout between Monte Attell and Johnny Coulson unless Attell agrees to box at 115 pounds ringside.

This is the ultimatum sent to James Coffroth, the San Francisco promoter by Emil Coulson, father of the bantam champion. Coulson says he has conceded enough in agreeing to a weight far above the bantamweight limit of today, and states that he will not agree to scaling six hours before the bout, as Attell wishes.

Coffroth wants to meet June 12 in a 25 round go," said the father of the champion, "but I think we have made concessions enough without giving Attell all he wants in the weight. Lou Boardman is after Johnny again but he will have to post a forfeit before we will notice him. William Scoville of Kansas City, has made an offer for Johnny to meet Kid Russell of Denver, May 14, in a ten round go at 110 pounds and if Attell does not make some concessions we will make this match."

THE POPE IS OPOSED.

Head Of The Catholic Church Does Not Approve Of Women In Politics.

NEW YORK, April 22.—The announcement from Rome that Pope Pius is opposed to women in politics created much interest among the partisans to both sides of the suffrage movement here. Mrs. Mary G. Hay, a leading suffragette, declared that nothing the Pope could say would hinder women from fighting for what they believed to be right. Frederick Nathan whose wife is one of the leading clubwomen of the country, takes a similar view. On the other hand, Mrs. Gilbert E. Jones, a leading anti-suffragette applauded the pope for the stand he had taken.

CANAL ZONE TEACHERS HAVE TROUBLES

RARE MIX UP OF SYSTEMS AND POINTS OF FEW CAUSE DIFFICULTIES.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Many difficulties are being encountered, according to official reports from the isthmian canal zone, in the grading of the public schools there. The point of view of people coming from hundreds of different places on educational matters has proved one of the greatest handicaps. Not only do the white children alone represent over 500 different schools and a score or more distinct educational systems, but the teachers themselves represent sixteen different states.

The absence and tardiness among the white pupils is very few, and among the colored children is described as chronic and under present conditions practically incurable. The constant changing of places of residence is cited as another difficulty encountered.

TO HANG SLAYER.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 22.—Preparations have been concluded at the county jail for the execution tomorrow of David Anderson, convicted murderer of Policeman Michael Callahan. The murder of Policeman Callahan occurred Jan. 9, 1908, when he sought to arrest Anderson and a companion, the latter being killed by the policeman.

MEETING OF Y. W. C. A.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 22.—Several hundred delegates, representing a membership of more than 184,000 young women, are attending the national biennial convention of the Young Women's Christian Association in session at the Central Presbyterian Church in this city. The delegates come from nearly all parts of the United States and Canada.

Rev. Andrew Gillies led the prayer service at the opening session this afternoon. Miss Grace Dodge of New York, national president, presided, and the chief speaker was Miss Mary E. Woolley, president of Mount Holyoke College, who took as her subject the Y. W. C. A. movement in relation to the problems of the women of today.

President Cyrus Northrop of the University of Minnesota presides at the session tonight, with President Francis J. McConnell of DePauw University as the chief speaker. Other persons of note who are to be heard at the succeeding sessions of the convention include Bishop Charles P. Anderson, of Chicago. Rev. Samuel L. Ewemer of the Student Volunteer Movement, Prof. Walter Rauschenbusch of the Rochester Theological Seminary, and Walter M. Wood, secretary of the Philadelphia Y. W. C. A.

FAMOUS SURGEON RETIRING.

LONDON, April 22.—By the retirement from practice next month of Sir Felix Semon the career of the leading throat specialist in Europe will be brought to a close. Sir Felix, who was born at Danzig sixty years ago, was the son of a stockbroker. Since 1901 he has held the position of physician extraordinary to King Edward, and his works on surgical subjects have earned him a wide reputation. Patients have even come from America to seek his advice, and not long ago the Khedive of Egypt was one who consulted him.

CANADIAN RECIPROCITY.

DETROIT, Mich., April 22.—In response to an invitation issued by the Detroit Board of Commerce, delegates representing the commercial organization of a number of the leading cities of the country assembled here today to take part in a three day conference for the discussion of the subject of Canadian reciprocity. The promoters of the conference believe that, in view of the Canadian preferential tariff law now in force, reciprocal trade relations to the mutual advantage of the United States and Canada can be brought about if Congress can be induced to take action in the matter.

THE VENEMOUS BULLET.

NE WYORK, April 22.—Antonio Villa neglected to pay rent for his furnished room to Mrs. Mary Pastri and when he returned home in West Hoboken last night she shot him. The bullet penetrated his body killing him instantly, passing out of a window and struck Mrs. Pastri's little daughter, who was playing in the yard. The child will die.

WAR ON POMPADOURS AND THE VAST HAT

WOMEN OF CHICAGO UNIVERSITY ATHLETIC BOARD DENOUNCE THEM

CHICAGO, April 22.—Big hats and lofty pompadours have been censured at the University of Chicago for scientific reasons. The personal appurtenances have been placed on the official blacklist by the department of physical culture and athletics and co-eds who insist upon retaining them will feel the wrath of the authorities.

Miss Gertrude Dudley, director of Woman's athletics, declares that the hats and pompadours not only are entirely unnecessary, as aids to the new education, but also are unquestionably unwise and intolerable from a hygienic standpoint. The immense hats, she says result in arresting the circulation of air to an extent which is decidedly harmful.

BULLFIGHTING UNIVERSITY.

MADRID, April 22.—A University of Bullfighting has been established at Biboa, and will open its doors July 1. It will take the place of the famous Seville Bullfighters' School, which was suppressed by King Ferdinand VII. early in the nineteenth century.

TO CHANGE THE DATE.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—Mr. J. Moroney, Chairman of the California Branch of the National Model License League, announces that the trade convention of all of the wine and spirit interests of the Pacific Coast, which was to have been held in San Francisco, May 10, has been postponed to May 17. The change in date is due to the fact that the time originally selected conflicts with other conventions to be held in San Francisco.

The object of the convention is to form the Coast trade into a gigantic organization that will work in concert against prohibition and in favor of the proper regulation of the liquor business on the Coast.

Mr. Moroney has been an ardent advocate of model license since the national organization formulated restrictive laws and he is convinced that all that is required to preserve the wine and spirit interests of the Coast is united action on the part of the trade in favor of all measures that will guarantee obedience to law and respect for public sentiment.

At the convention the national body will be represented by Capt. D. M. Smith, General Counsel of the League who will deliver an address on the legal and political phases of the liquor problem.

WIDOW WANTS MORE.

CHICAGO, April 22.—After deliberating for five months Mrs. Suzella Ella Dean, widow of John E. Dean, who died November 10, 1908, has decided to contest her late husband's will. She has brought suit in the Supreme Court for the dower interest in her husband's estates which is valued at \$1,170,000. By the terms of the will she was to receive only \$25,000 and the income from \$50,000, the latter being conditional upon her acceptance of the terms of the will without a contest and in accordance with an ante-nuptial agreement. The "Dean Twins," well known in society are the daughters of Mr. Dean by a former wife.
