The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, April 27—Fruit dealers reported a good demand for berries and only a moderate supply. The best Los Angeles berries, freely at \$1.50 a crate and Floriofreed readily at \$1.75 to \$2.00. Three cars of bananas came in from South. They were in good shape, the most part and were put on market at the usual prices. Apples held firmly at the last prices, and the market here and South was strong.

All shipments of apples are still in from the country, the bulk arrivals being fair to common. At the prices that have ruled months the trade is none too

to 27 cents today, and as a result the local makers are together again in the matter of prices. The drop was due to the generally weaker situation in the Coast markets, which is to be expected at this time of the year. Some of the butter makers look for a further decline in the near future.

Cheese showed little if any loss of strength today, but production is increasing in such a way that a cut in quotations must come before very long.
