

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, May 3.—The butter market is weaker all around and there is little doubt that a further decline is coming soon. The chances are that city creamery will be down to 25 cents before the end of this week. As a matter of fact, there is some city creamery now selling at that figure, shading being more or less general, and on the street today the sale by one of the leading creamery concerns of the city of a lot of butter at 24 cents was reported. This, however, was not confirmed.

Oregon Berries Coming Soon.
The present warm weather is pushing the strawberry crop of this state to maturity in a lively way, and the chances are that there will be small offerings of Southern Oregon berries in the market the latter part of this week or the first of next. Liberal supplies from that quarter can hardly be expected before the middle of the month. The Hood River growers this year look for a crop of 55,000 to 60,000 crates and they will begin shipping about May 20. Florin berries are in since Saturday, and sold to day at \$1.40 to \$1.50 a crate.

Break in Eggs Predicted.
Egg dealers today quoted 24c to 25c generally, while a few held fictitiously fancied stock worth 25c. But it was clear that the detertone of the market was none too long and some dealers look for a break in the near future. Receipts for the day were 1 car of Eastern and 9 cases of Oregon.
